CASE WAS DISMISSED

AGAINST A GANANOQUE TAVERN KEEPER.

A Howe Island Wedding—Death of William Newberry at Athens—Four Boys Arrested For Breaking Windows.

Gananoque, Oct. 13.—A pretty wedding took place at St. Philomena's church, Howe Island, at nine o'clock, Monday morning, when Miss Lily May Lachance, of Bayview dairy farm, was united in marriage to Joseph Knud Lund, of Goronia, Isthmus of Panama. The ceremony was performed by Rev. John P. Kehoe, pastor of St. John's church, Gananoque, before a goodly number of invited guests. After the ceremony the bride party repaired to the home of the bride's parents, where a dainty repast was served. The bride was the recipient of numerous handsome tokens of esteem attesting to her popularity among a large circle of friends. Mr. and Mrs. Lund left during the afternoon for the east to spend their honeymoon, prior to leaving for their southern home, William Newberry, for many years a resident of this town, passed to his rest at Athens, on Sunday last, in the sixty-ninth year of his age. Deceased had been in a crippled condition for several months past, caused by acute rheumatism. He leaves a family of four sons and four daughters. The remains were brought here and the funeral took place Tuesday afternoon, from the residence of his daughter, Mrs. M. Lappan, King street, to Gananoque cemetery. George Genge, proprietor of the Arlington Hotel, and arraigned before Police Magistrate Carroll, Monday afternoon, charged with selling liquor to an intoxicated person. The party receiving the liquor, testified that it was only a soft drink. The magistrate, considering the evidence insufficient for conviction, dismissed the case. This was the first appearance of a local license holder in the police court for more than a year. Chief Ryan took four young lads in charge last evening, who were breaking glass in the windows of Robert Murehie's blacksmith shop a few miles east of the town. Their parents were notified that unless the amount of damage was settled, the matter would be brought into court for adjudgment. How "Scandals" Are Made.

A local contemporary says that it has been discovered that Hal McGivern, who is a liberal candidate in Ottawa, "got a \$1,000 fee for a few minutes' work in bidding for some property that the government wanted." Mr. McGivern and his partner were commissioned by the government to purchase a certain piece of property, which was being sold under mortgage, and for which the government was asked \$50,000. When Mr. McGivern's firm, Lyman, Kingston, minister of public works intimated that on no consideration would the government pay a price exceeding \$45,000. Mr. McGivern attended the sale, supposedly in the interest of other clients, when it was withdrawn from sale, and remained in the hands of the master of the high court. After several days' negotiations his firm put in a bid for \$40,000, and after holding out for some time the master and the liquidator accepted this offer. The commission paid to Mr. McGivern's firm was 2 1/2 per cent. The government thus obtained for \$41,000 the property which had been held at \$50,000, and which local real estate men advised, was worth \$45,000. Mr. McGivern refers the public to the officials of the courts and the liquidator for corroboration of his statement.
