The bullet sped over his head and lodged in the side of the waggon, Jones, believing he had killed Guiteau, dug his spurs into horse's side and escaped arrest at the time. He was captured shortly afterwards near Fredericksburg, Va., and such was the interest of the crowd was tried and acquitted.

FORTY-ONE CONVICTIONS.

Result of Recent Raids Made Northern Ontario.

Toronto, Oct. 13.-Forty-one convic tions in all were recorded as the re sult of the raids made by officers o the provincial license department in the vicinity of the Montreal river, in Northern Ontario, last week. Some of this number were for breaches of the liquor license act and others for in fractions of the law respecting disorderly houses. Keepers of "blind pigs," proprietors of disorderly houses, and the frequenters and inmates of the latter were punished. The raids were entirely unexpected and as a result few of those in the dives escaped. In one place a woman was caught in a well-like excavation under the floor and men were discovered in the rafters under the roof.




