"The whole story converges on the uestion of monogamy, as ordained in Eden, and was intended to rebuke the lustful orientalism into which Solomon's court had fallen. The family life had been debauched and a social condition was exposed that had drained the resources of the land. It is the true, inflexible love of one woman for one man as proof against the assault of passion and of position that is held up to praise.'

One of the most disastrous fires that ever occurred in Harowe took place last Saturday morning, when our cheese factory was destroyed. The fire started about four o'clock. Proprietor Gibbs, who is also the cheese maker, and who lives only about three rods from the facteemed Citizen of Bethany, tory, was awakened by the roaring of he fire, but when he got there nothing could be saved. Many farmers rushed to the scene, but could do nothing to save the building as it was too far gone. One of the patrons had not received his money for August cheese yet and it was in the factory, so Mr. Gibbs broke open the door and endeavored to get the money and the factory books, but the nine chaese destroyed. For the first time in several months, the cheese was not shipped that week, owing to the fact that Mr. Critchley had not delivered the cheese boxes. The insurance will not cover much over half of the loss. Most of the patrons are now sending their milk to Cloyne fac tory. We hope that Mr. Gibbs or Mr. Black (the former owns the factory), will erect another factory soon,
