A TERRIBLE INDICTMENT

MR. FOSTER INVITES FURTHER EXPOSURE.

It is Given Him in Toronto—This Man Must Go—Completely Discredited Before the People—Here is His Drooping Cause.

My answer on Tuesday night to his charge that I "lied" stands unweakened by anything. Indeed I would not take much active part in the campaign in this constituency, had it not been that Mr. Foster challenged the genuineness of certain letters, and described as "false" the allegation that he had taken a private commission, a very large rake-off, in land transactions which he conducted as manager of the Union Trust company.

"Mr. Foster tried to cast doubt on the facts and motives of those letters. He said they were not perfect. He asked for the dates. He wanted to examine the signatures. But, sir—and this is significant—he did not deny having written such demands for reserve funds of the Foundation to be used in speculative land transactions unauthorized by the Canadian law governing the investment of trust funds. He dared not make such denial.

"And Mr. Foster need not wax his righteous soul about those letters. They are not lost. Their contents are not forgotten by others. He need not pretend to have forgotten them himself. Let me refresh his memory. Let me recall the letter he wrote to "Dear Dr. Oronhyatekha" from the Adelphi Hotel, London, Eng.—he remembers the date—in which he discussed the critical condition of the Union Trust company, how needful it was that relief be found; how before leaving Toronto he had urged upon Supreme Chief Secretary Macgillivray that the use of the I.O.F. reserves, and had left a memorandum giving his views. He remembers that. Let me remind him of the series of letters he wrote to the supreme chief ranger on his return to Canada, urging with insistent emphasis the need for more money to meet payments which he said were "coming due every day." Does he not remember one long and careful letter in which he set forth a list of the largest of those payments, amounting far up into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, which he had great wealth and other speculative land investments? Those payments the Union Trust under his management, was at that date unable to meet, and upon the securities he confessed he could not borrow another dollar from the banks.

The Wheels Needed Oil.

"Now, sir, it was when facing that crisis, a crisis which in his opinion might eventuate in a catastrophe within three months, Mr. Foster again wrote to Dr. Oronhyatekha another urgent demand in which occur these very significant words, these very words: 'The wheels of the Union Trust are in need of oil. Turn on the tap.'

"It need not concern Mr. Foster, and it does not interest the public, to be told how I know the contents of those letters, their demands, and the serious facts which made their demands urgent. I know more of Mr. Foster's record in mismanaging the Union Trust company, and as director of a variety of speculative concerns, wildest mining and otherwise, than has ever yet been told.

"I turn now to the matter of the commission, the private rake-off taken by Mr. Foster in land transactions as manager of the funds of the I.O.F. entrusted to his care in the Union Trust company. There was a variety of them. He had little indicates in vesting trust monies in large profits. He had a collection all his own. It was \$2,450. He asked for it. He got it. It was a rake-off."

A voice: What has that to do with this election?

Mr. Macdonald—"It has everything to do with this election. It involves the honor, the business integrity, of the man who asks the men of North Toronto to elect him again as our representative in the parliament of Canada. We did not know it when he was elected four years ago. We must know it now."
