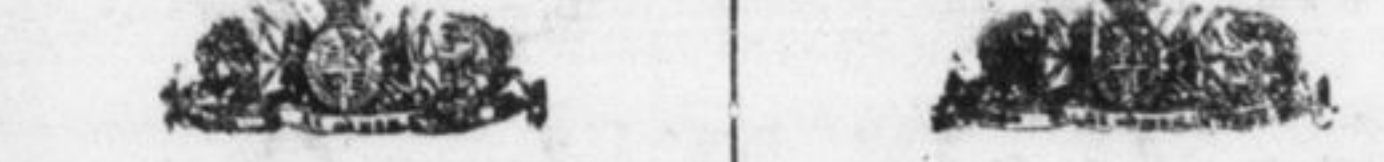

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered Sections South of Township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00. DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 24 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

A BIG FIRE ON FARM SERIOUS LOSS TO A.W. CATON NEAR NAPANEE.

Death of a Young Lady—Enjoying a Week's Fishing—Remains of Men on Trial—Personal Notes. Napanee, Oct. 16.—On Wednesday evening, about eight o'clock, A. W. Caton lost his two barns, drive house and contents consisting of hay and feed, and about sixty hogs, by fire. He managed to save his cows. The new silo under construction was badly damaged by the fire. The origin of the fire is unknown, and Mr. Caton cannot account for it. Not twenty minutes before the fire was observed he was in the barns and left everything all right. The buildings were insured, but Mr. Caton's loss will be considerable.

On Wednesday, May Van Blaricom passed away, after six months' illness, aged twenty-two years. Deceased was a dear girl beloved by all who knew her. She leaves one brother Edgar. Her father and mother are both dead. The funeral will take place this afternoon.

Joseph McFarlane of Amherst Island arrested a week ago for cruelty to an animal was brought before Magistrate Rankin, Wednesday, and remanded until Monday in order that more witnesses could be subpoenaed. Frederick York arrested near Tamworth for horse-stealing was remanded for sentence until next week.

Garratt Vanalstine, Palace Road, is at present, very low and slight hopes are held out for his recovery. Mr. Vanalstine suffered a paralytic stroke last April, and has been confined to his bed ever since.

Division Court.

Pennock vs. Mitchell—G. F. Henderson, K.C., and J. A. Jackson (Gannanque), for the defendant, appealed from the judgment of Magee, J., at the trial on April 22nd, 1908. E. D. Armour, K.C., and W. B. Carroll (Gannanque), for the plaintiff, contra. The action was brought by the father of Lucy Maud Pennock, a girl of eighteen years of age, who fell into a hole cut in the ice by defendants, contractors, for the purpose of bringing a steamer into the wharf at Gannanque, while skating on the St. Lawrence, and \$2,000 damages claimed. Judgment was given for the plaintiff for \$500. Defendants appealed. Appeal dismissed with costs.

Paid a Great Tribute.

Bishop Stringer, of Yukon diocese, paid a great tribute to Major Fitzpatrick Horgan, of the North-West Mounted Police, a Picton boy, in speaking in St. Mary Magdalene's church, in that town, on missionary work. He said most, law and order would be far different in the north were all as upright as he. "Fitz" Horgan, as he is chiefly known, is a Roman Catholic, and the tribute is paid him by an Anglican bishop whom people who love party shibboleth dub a "low" churchman. All parties, however, recognize him as a self-denying hero and the worthy successor of the apostle of the north, Bishop Bompas.

VOLUNTEER BOUNTY ACT, 1908.

WARNING TO PURCHASERS.

Special attention is called to Sub-section 3 of Section 5 of the Volunteer Bounty Act, 1908 which provides that no assignment of the right of a volunteer by the appointment of a substitute shall be accepted or recognized by the Department of the Interior which is not Executed and Dated After the Date of the Warrant for the Land Grant issued by the Minister of Militia and Defence in favor of the Volunteer.
