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A NEW ROORBACK. EVERY STATEMENT IN IT WAS A FALSEHOOD.

No Subscription Asked—The Contractors Have Not Been Persecuted As Declared. Ottawa Correspondence of Globe.

The campaign of roorbacks respecting the National Transcontinental railway, which Hon. George P. Graham announced last week would be hatched in the fertile brain of an American election expert, hired by the opposition party leaders, has evidently started.

This morning the tory press had a sensational article, supposedly sent out from Matheson in New Ontario, alleging that the Reynolds Construction company, because of a refusal to subscribe to the liberal campaign funds, had been subjected to persecution by the National Transcontinental commission, and was being forced to give up the contract.

Other statements were made in the despatch charging reckless extravagance in the construction of the road and that as a result the Grand Trunk would seek to abrogate its bargain with the government.

Refutation of the charges comes as quickly and conclusively as in the case of the roorback sprung the previous day against Hon. Dr. Pugsley, of St. John. H. Murray, secretary-treasurer of the Reynolds Construction company, who happens to be in the city to-day, and whose company is building a 150-mile stretch of the National Transcontinental in the vicinity of Lake Abitibi, gives an emphatic denial to the report published in the conservative press.

"The report which I have seen in the press," said Mr. Murray, "is without foundation, and is most unfair to the National Transcontinental commissioners and to their chief engineer, Mr. Lumsden."

He has never been asked for a subscription to any political fund. We have not been subject to any such persecution as has been stated in the press. The resident engineers of the construction commission have been fair in classification of material which we have received, and we have no complaints on that score. We have received no notices of any sort from the commission or from its chief engineer. As a matter of fact we have no dealings with them.

The contractors are hiring and awarding to the Grand Trunk Pacific company. That company sub-let the contract to us. All of our dealings are with the Grand Trunk Pacific company and not with the government.

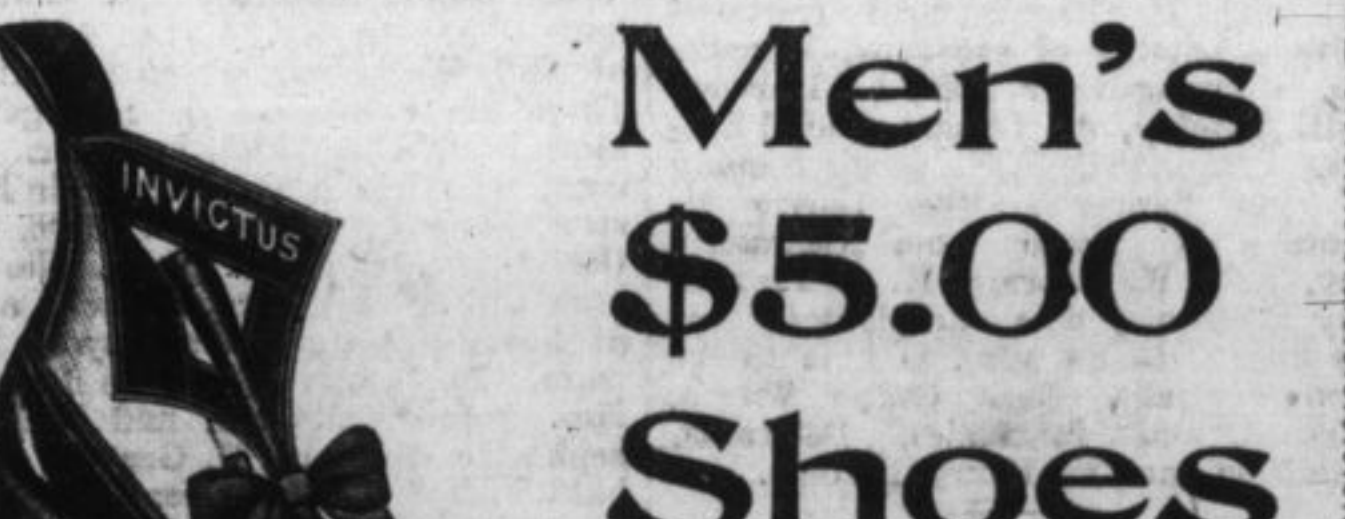
