

LODGED A PROTEST AGAINST DECISIONS OF REFEREE MOXLEY.

Queen's II Dissatisfied With Result of R.M.C. Game—Yacht Club Team to Practice This Afternoon.

The management of Queen's II team has laid a protest before the executive of the C.I.R.F.U., over Saturday's game with Cadets, when Queen's lost the game 11 to 5, in the last second of play. The protest is laid on three decisions of Referee Moxley, which Queen's claim were not right. The executive will meet in Toronto this evening, and representatives from both colleges went up at noon. In case the protest is allowed, the game will be played over on Thursday, so that the winning team may meet McGill. From the side lines some say that Queen's have good grounds for protest and some say the opposite. The result of the meeting will be awaited with interest.

Queen's Working Lightly. Queen's players were all resting on Monday after their hard battle. None of them are very badly broken up but still they feel pretty sore in spots. A number of them were over at the gymnasium in the afternoon, and received a good rub, which timbered them up a great deal. The first team were to get out for a light practice this afternoon. The second team will keep in shape to practice with the seniors.

Queen's III were out bright and early on Monday, after their defeat by the Collegiate on Saturday. They are not going to be caught napping again and are getting in trim for cadets. They are not as strong as they have been in previous years but hope to win quit.

Yacht Club Practice. The Yacht Club team called a practice for the C.I.R.F.U. this afternoon, when all players were to be on hand. This team is improving every day, and should defeat Gananoque when they meet a week from Saturday. The old players will nearly all be out, and it will make a great difference.

TUBERCULOSIS CASES. Said There Are Fifty of Them in Kingston.

Fifty cases of tuberculosis in the city! Who would suspect it? Yet this is the statement made by Dr. Etherington at the Board of Education last evening when he appeared before it. The Ontario government has prepared an exhibit which is being sent from place to place in order that direct and intelligent instruction may be given upon the subject. The older scholars are taken to the hall (Ontario in this city), and shown the development of the disease by various illustrations of a kind that are most impressive.

It is through the young that the medical educationists expect to influence the masses, so that in time the white plague may be eradicated, for if the necessary precautions are taken, it is possible to end the contagion or infection of the most fearful of all afflictions. Dr. Etherington commented on the fact that a few cases of small-pox created a sensation and the attempt would be made to stamp out the disease at any cost. Similarly a few cases of typhoid fever would occasion a most searching enquiry as to the cause of them. But tuberculosis, the most deadly of all diseases, was tolerated, and every week there was a death from it. One physician figured up eighteen cases of which he had a knowledge.

The disease can be stamped out, and the sooner the effort is made the better.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate five acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered Sections South of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the South Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in
