ACTION FOR LIBEL

(Continued from page 6). date. Mr. Cox said he had. Mr. Avery arose and denied that he had ever canvassed Mr. Cox to vote for Mr. Thomson as member for the county.

Dr. Edwards said that Mr. Avery had pledged himself to support the choice of the convention and now he had broken his word. He denied that he had packed the convention. He had received 111 votes to his 66. In the convention of 1903 Mr. Avery had defeated him by seven votes and there were many who believed that convention to be unfair, as Kennebec township had too many delegates. He felt sore over the result, naturally.

Dr. Edwards asked why Mr. Avery had not condemned the salary grab, even if he wasn't there to vote on the question, as the conservatives asked him. He charged that instead Mr. Avery had voted against Mr. MacLean's motion to repeal the indemnity vote. Mr. Avery arose and said Dr. Edwards' statement was not true. The motion, he said, was never put on the floor of the house.

As to his position of county clerk and jail physician he was ready at any time to resign as clerk. The county council had given him an increase as jail surgeon. Dr. Edwards said he had made enemies in Frontenac because he had stood between men who tried to loot the county treasury and the people. He claimed that he had stood for the people's rights. He had stopped Sheriff Dawson in taking too much in fees, as he was doing. That amounted to \$200 or \$300 a year.

As to "trimming" Dr. Edwards charged that Jabez Stones had been knifed by men of his own party and that Mr. Avery had slid in as a candidate on this account.

As to the Vanluchen defalcation Dr. Edwards said that the audit showed that the only two years picked out when there was no defalcation were the years in which he was an auditor. He charged that Mr. Avery had voted to give Mr. Vanluchen a clearance, but the motion was voted down. Whenever county matters came up the speaker said that Mr. Avery considered himself first and the county afterwards. What had Mr. Avery done in parliament? the speaker asked.

Dr. Edwards gave the Laurier government credit for reducing the postal rates and for some other legislation it had enacted. He favored giving better mail service to the rural districts, spending money on drowned lands, a better class of immigration; revision of tariff, particularly along the line affecting the farmers; far more agricultural colleges and schools and better facilities for transporting farm produce.

Dr. Edwards said that it was announced that some liberals were supporting Mr. Avery because of their hatred of the speaker. That was a high standard of politics, surely! The doctor declared that he would defeat Mr. Avery in his own township, and also in Keweenaw and Pownal. Mr. Avery, he said, would not get the solid north county vote, as he thought he would. The speaker declared he would triumph by a big majority.

In closing, Dr. Edwards said he would support what he thought in the best interests of the country. He claimed he possessed all the qualifications necessary to represent the people of Frontenac. He denied that he had ever sent a bill for five hundred dollars to the widow of the late G. W. Bell for platform speaking in 1896, and read a letter from the son of the deceased, bauling the statement as a lie. It was nobody's business, Dr. Edwards said, if he was paid for public speaking.

Mr. Avery took a few minutes to reply, and denied the various charges made by Dr. Edwards against him. He said the doctor would not win in the north county but would get a good trimming. He was confident of being returned as Frontenac's member.

MCMULLEN IS OUT.

He Withdrew From Prince Edward County Contest.

Picton, Oct. 20.—The expected has happened. H. C. McMullen, who, a month ago, announced himself an independent candidate for the federal elections, has failed to come up to the scratch. Monday afternoon, at the nomination meeting, presided over by the returning officer, D. Burleigh, Wellington, there were but two candidates put in the field, Dr. Currie, liberal, whose agent will be C. B. Allison, and G. O. Alcorn, conservative, whose agent will be W. H. Williamson. Mr. McMullen made an explanation for not entering the field as at first announced. He said he never had any intention to make it a three-cornered fight. When he entered as an independent liberal he said—he understood there would be an independent conservative in the running. Were he to run he knew his friends would be only throwing away their votes. Just here it might be remarked that there is a little bird whispering the truth to the effect that Mr. McMullen has been won over by the smiles of the conservatives. It was openly stated by McMullen that he had two hundred conservative votes promised him. This rather went against the grain of the conservative party, hence the "pulling off."

Speeches were made by Dr. Currie, G. O. Alcorn and J. W. Johnston, M.P.P., Belleville, on behalf of Mr. Alcorn.

Clayton, Mo., Oct. 19.—A jury here decided that Justice of the Peace E. C. Kroenung, Gumbo, must pay Miss May Eatheron, Chesterfield, \$1,000 damages for making her disrobe. Miss Eatheron testified that, while she was employed at August Glaser's, a pocket-book containing \$250 was missed. Justice Kroenung was summoned, and made her take off all her clothing, except a short petticoat and a light waist, in an attempt to find the money. The money was found later where it had been mislaid.

COFFER-DAM COMPLETED.

Work on Trent Canal is Progressing Favorably.

Trenton, Ont., Oct. 19.—The work on the Trent canal in this section is still progressing well. The large coffer-dam at dam No. 2 has been pumped out and fifty men are busy clearing away the loose boulders and gravel which cover the rock bottom. Thousands of loads of gravel brought by teams and machinery already installed, are in readiness to begin the construction of the eastern half of the dam. Surveyors are in town in connection with the water level from Trenton to Peterboro.

KIDNAPPED BOY FOUND.

Turned Adrift By Blackmailers Demanded \$10,000.

Chicago, Oct. 19.—After an absence of nearly four weeks, and given up as dead by his parents, Giuseppe Giunta, seven years old, was found by a police-man wandering about the Grand Central depot. He was taken to a police station, where he was later claimed by his father, Antonio Giunta, a retired grocer, and taken home. A week after the disappearance of the boy the father received a letter demanding a ransom of \$10,000. The father tried to raise the money, but, not meeting with success, gave up the boy as dead.

Hon. James R. Mann, of Chicago, is the man investigating the illegal activities of the World Trade Trust, which is blamed for the enormous rise in prices of newspaper of all grades and classes. Bethelere, N.Y., Oct. 19.—Mrs. Arthur Walters died here from lockjaw. She had fourteen teeth extracted. The next day she became ill, and it was thought this condition was due to the anaesthetic administered by the dentist. Unmistakable signs of tetanus developed, and the woman suffered frightful agony. The disease advanced rapidly, and death released her. She was twenty-five years old.
