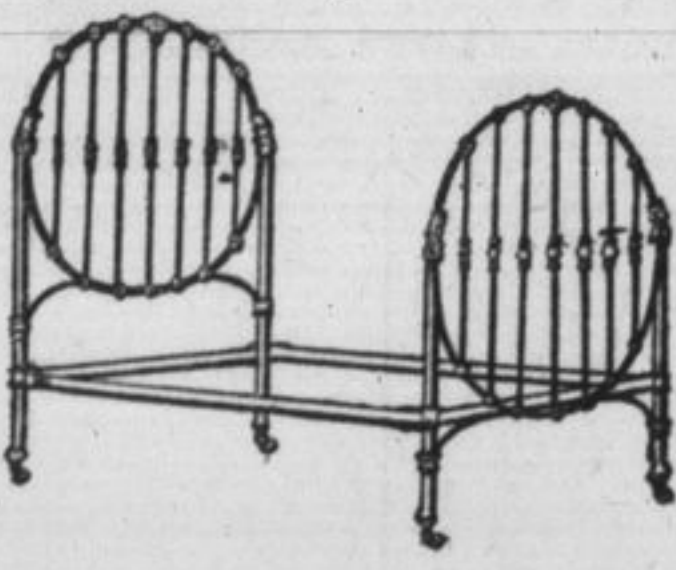


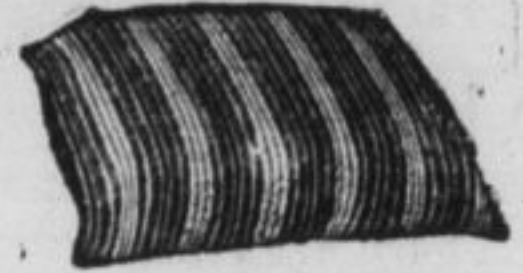

# HARTY STILL REIGNS

## As Member for Kingston in the Commons.

### He Was Re-Elected by 349 Majority--An Immense Crowd Acclaimed Him at the Whig Office.

Hon. William Harty will continue to represent Kingston in the House of Commons for the next five years. At the polls on Monday he was given the emphatic endorsement of the people, who re-elected him by 349 majority. A victory for Mr. Harty was predicted all through the campaign, but the liberals realized that they would have to work hard to win, as the conservatives had chosen their strongest man, in the person of Dr. Ross, as their standard-bearer. During the few days before the election the conservative leaders appeared quite confident that their candidate might nose out a win. It was rumored that a whole barrel of toby money had come here on Saturday, and that the conservatives were going to put Mr. Harty out of political life. This put additional life into the liberals, and the result, as it has been, is the result. It has at last dawned upon his opponents that Mr. Harty is invincible, and that he receives support from conservatives and independents as well as liberals.

At a quarter past five o'clock the first subdivision result reached the Whig office in front of which a great crowd had gathered. This return was from No. 25 Victoria ward, and it read: Harty, 53; Ross, 48. No. 3 came next, and this new toby stronghold was turned right about face, Harty

### The Speeches Delivered.

At 5.45 o'clock, when it was known that Hon. William Harty had been elected by such a handsome majority, the crowd called for speeches. Dr. A. W. Richardson spoke from the Whig office window, and he was greeted with loud cheers by 2,500 people. He said that he had been asked on behalf of Mr. Harty to express to the electors the candidate's great appreciation of the confidence which had again been placed in him. The speaker himself felt very grateful for the result of the election in the city. It was true he said, that Mr. Harty and the liberal party had the city of Kingston by the neck (cheers). He would say that Mr. Harty's arms were not only around the city's neck, but around its whole being. He was glad that the electors had once more placed their confidence in such an honorable man as Mr. Harty, and elected him to represent the city in the parliament of this great and glorious dominion.

### Mr. Harty Cheered.

Mr. Harty followed, and his appearance at the window, brought forth a storm of applause. So great was the enthusiasm that it was several minutes before he was able to respond.

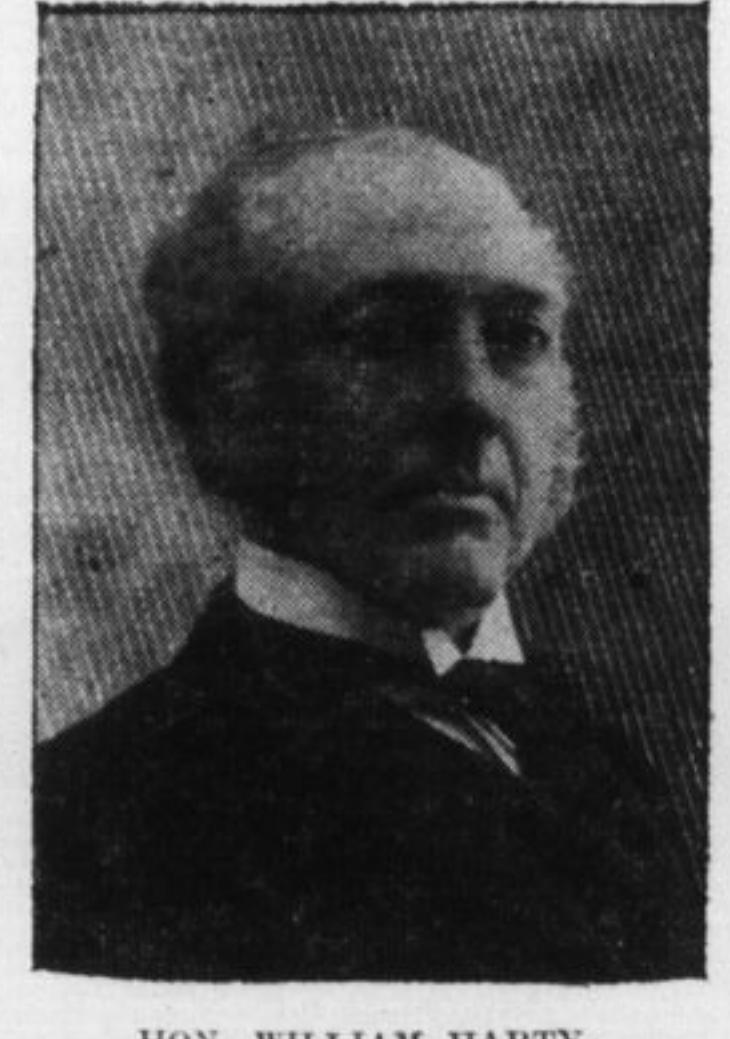
"Electors of the city of Kingston and Portsmouth," began Mr. Harty. "You know we cannot forget the little village of Portsmouth. It is all right. (Cheers). Once more it is my great pleasure, to appear before you, and thank you for the renewal of your confidence. You have given me a handsome majority, and thereby, I will be your representative for another five years. (Cheers). You have been doing that now for seventeen years; you have added five more years, and if it is God's wish that I should live for five more years, I will then have represented you in parliament for close upon a quarter of a century (loud cheers). I wish to express my gratitude to you all. I can only say that in the past I have at all times endeavored to do all that I could to further your interests, and I will go on in the same manner for the next five years. (Cheers)."

Continuing, Mr. Harty said that on an occasion such as this, it would not be for him to thank any particular class of the community, for the work which had been done, but he himself had not been given any of the work, had had saved all this by his supporters. The speaker had not now the strength he had in former years.

"The election held, to-day," said Mr. Harty, "has been an election by the people for the people, and for the city of Kingston. (Loud applause)."

"I claim no credit, what was done was by your own activity. To you I give all the credit, and for this majority. I say that I feel prouder of it than any larger one in the past. (Cheers)."

"I desire to thank my loyal old friends of the liberal party, who, in the first place, nominated me as their candidate, and who have stood by me up to the present time. (Loud cheers). I wish to thank them for their continued confidence in me. There was never an occasion when I felt that I was more under obligation to them, than the present. I wish also to thank the independent vote of the city, which has done more for me than any other mind. I know that we have not a majority of 345 with liberals alone. When we look at the vote we know that it has been enlarged by a great number of citizens, not attached to one party or the other, but who have voted in the interest of the city. I recognize this fact thoroughly, that the independent vote, particularly the property holders' vote, has been behind me, and what for? Because they had the confidence that I would do in the future what I have done in the past--look after the best interests of their fellowmen in the city." (Loud applause.)

getting a majority of fifteen. The returns continued to favor Harty to the delight of the crowd of liberal workers gathered in the Whig office and the immense assemblage of people who filled the street in front of the newspaper building. It was soon seen that it was only a question of majority for Harty, who at one time was 450 in the lead. A few of Dr. Ross' strongholds were to come and they reduced the above figures to 349.

Mr. Harty entered the Whig office at half past five o'clock and was loudly cheered. While the returns were being posted the great crowd in the street cheered loudly every time Mr. Harty's majority advanced. When the final result was announced, there was great jubilation. For some time there was a wild scene within and without, men and boys being frantic with delight at the great victory.

Three hearty cheers and a "tiger" were given for Mr. Harty as he retired.

### Elmer Davis Speaks.

Elmer Davis, president of the Young Liberal Club, was warmly received. "I rejoice with you, to-night, in the great victory which has been added to the old historic city of Kingston," he said, in opening.

"Kingston to-day has done herself great credit, in having once more elected her chief citizen as representative for the dominion parliament, for the next five years.

"We rejoice in the victory which has been achieved," added the speaker. "It is a victory that speaks for itself in more ways than one. Our friends, the enemy, saw fit to wage a campaign more or less of slander. Kingston thus kind of a campaign. I hope that the lesson will be a lasting one, and that future campaigns in this old city will be conducted on a higher level, and more on the great issues than has been the case.

"I rejoice and thank you as president of the Young Liberal Club, for the grand support you have given in this campaign to-day," said Mr. Davis, in conclusion.

### Dr. Ross' Statement.

The returns were received by Dr. Ross and his supporters in the Standard office. Every return that came in was waited with interest and when a ward gave Ross a majority a cheer would ring out, but the other returns

were received in quietness. After every return the conservative ward workers would come straggling in, tired out and disappointed after their hard day's work. Dr. Ross took his defeat quietly. When the last returns were in his local supporters gave him a hearty cheer and forced him from the office to the front steps where he made a speech. The defeated candidate made no charges against the other party. He only stated that if there had not been an election an order would have been received here for twenty-five locomotives. "I can safely say that I have not lost a friend in this campaign," said Dr. Ross. "Many of my friends voted against me, but they are still my friends, and I hold no hard feelings. He then thanked all who voted for him and all that used their influence to have him elected.

### At The Opera House.

After the returns of the city election had been received, the crowds journeyed to the Grand Opera House, where the returns were received from all the provinces, and announced upon the stage. The G.N.W. Telegraph Co. placed a special wire in the house, for the occasion, and rendered a good service. The theatre was packed from the pit to the gallery, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed.

# CORRIGAN'S.

Young Liberal Club, announced the returns, and as the story of the sweeping victory for the liberal party was told, the audience went wild with excitement.

Hon. William Harty arrived at the theatre about eight o'clock, and this was the signal for another good demonstration. It was indeed a magnificent ovation that was tendered Kingston's popular member. Mr. Harty occupied a seat in one of the boxes, and during the evening received the congratulations of a host of friends.

There was no speech-making, the meeting being called simply for the receiving of the returns from all over the province. It was a very late hour when the crowd retired.

During the evening, Mr. Tremear, the blind pianist, favored with a number of fine selections, and the bugle band, which was out in the parade, visited the theatre and made things very lively.

### Notes And Comments.

The Standard got it in the neck. Harty carried all but Frontenac and Rideau wards.

The locomotive works will have five more years of prosperity with Laurier in power.

Instead of holding Kingston merely by the neck, Harty has both arms around the dear old place.

Now that the elections are over the political workers can lend a hand to the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

"Laurier, Harty and Continued Prosperity" blazed forth on the outside of the liberal campaign rooms, yesterday.

Portsmouth did its duty well, yesterday, but it might have given a few more majority, so that the figure wouldn't be the unlucky number 13.

"Turn the rascals out!" quoth the Standard. And the people did so by defeating the notorious toby trio, known as Bennett, Fowler and Lefurgy.

The Whig had an extra, containing the full returns from all over Canada, on the streets at 1:30 o'clock, this morning. The paper was eagerly bought up.

In this election, 4,105 votes were cast, or sixty-two more than in the dominion election of 1904. The registered vote this year was 500 less than four years ago.

Christopher J. Graham prophesied fifty majority in Victoria ward for Dr. Ross. He was just out 109. He and George Taylor, of Gananoque, are a fine team of guessers.

For a quarter of an hour after the election results were announced, the whistle of the locomotive works was blown continuously in honor of the president's great victory.

The liberals conceded Ross a majority in Frontenac and Rideau wards, but thought that in his own ward, Frontenac, he would have had more. Twenty-four was rather small.

Mr. Harty's big majority is due to a great extent to the excellent organization of the liberals. The successful campaign was conducted by John McLeod, president of the Reform Association.

There was great joy in the local liberal camp, last evening, when the defeat of the notorious Fowler, Bennett and Lefurgy was flashed over the wires. These are the rascals the people turned out.

The announcement of the returns of the country was watched by a large crowd on Princess street, when Laurier's return was assured at eight o'clock, the toby chiefs buttoned up their coats and headed for home.

William Robinson, ex-M.P.P., who took ill last Friday, was able to go to the polls, yesterday, and cast his vote for Harty. He was one of the oldest residents who voted in the election. He would rather fast a week than miss a chance to cast a great vote.

At eight o'clock, last evening, a large number of locomotive works' employees formed a parade. They drove in cabs and vans, and were armed with horns and fireworks. Locomotive bells were also used to add to the pandemonium. A bugle band played the procession through the streets.

There was great cheering in the theatre when the victory of W. L. Mackenzie King, the grandson of the famous "rebel of '37," was announced. Mr. King, who will be the new minister of labor, succeeds Whiskey King (conservative) in North Waterloo, which has turned over to the grid side.

The largest majority secured in any one subdivision was that of seventy-two in Cataract, No. 9. That is the division of which Michael Sullivan, government works' contractor, is head. The announcement of this majority was received with thundering cheers. Next in size of subdivision majority was that of seventy in Cataract, No. 8, and the third largest was in No. 2, Sydenham, where sixty-four was secured.
