### Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

#### Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section, 160 acres, and if available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands office in the town or city of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or any other head of a family.

**DUTIES.**—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or any other head of a family.

A homesteader in good standing may purchase quarter-sections, and become a homesteader. Price \$3.00 per acre. Purchased improvements may be taken up on any suitable land on either odd or even numbered Sections or townships 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railways and the West line of roads 26 and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

## TO GREET LAURIER

### OTTAWA IS PREPARING FOR THE PREMIER.

Who Will Soon Enter the Capital  
—It is Expected That Many  
Tory Heads Will Now Be Cut  
Off.

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—The liberals are preparing a big welcome home to the premier to Ottawa and are getting enthusiastic over the matter. Nothing is yet known as to which constituency the premier will sit for. There will be a keen fight for nomination between the factions if he does not retain Ottawa.

The civil service, to-day, is in a very different spirit from yesterday, and there is a feeling in the air that some reprisals may now be taken by the government for political agitations in the departments.

The council of the National Rifle Association, of England, has now endorsed the Spittal position of firing at the ranges and has written expressing regrets that Lieut. Spittal should have been interfered with at a critical period in his Bisley shooting by the range officers. The letter of the secretary of the P.R.A. stated that there is nothing laid down in the Bisley regulations against such a position as that assumed by Spittal. The question will be considered by the British council and a new regulation adopted before next year's meet. This is the substance of a letter to Col. Labelle, commandant of the Canadian rifle teams at Bisley.

#### ACCUSED OF MURDER.

Frightened \$300 Out of German Neighbor.

Woodstock, Ont., Oct. 27.—One of the most remarkable stories in police history in Woodstock has come to light during the past few days. On Friday Robert Colwell was arrested in Port Huron and brought back to Woodstock charged with blackmail. He is guilty and will be sentenced on Friday.

The second arrest was made in the person of J. B. Rounds, a highly respected resident of Brumfitt, who was taken into custody on a similar charge, and remanded for trial before the magistrate.

It was alleged against Colwell that on Christmas day, 1906, he, by threats and intimidation, secured \$300 from an old German named Charles Damm. The story as the police have it is that Colwell, and some other man whom he hired, and who brought along his revolver, met Damm and took him into a back room of a local hotel. There they pretended to put him under arrest, telling him he was charged with the murder of a man named Turner, who, it is learned, died of natural causes beyond dispute. They badly frightened the man, but told him that if he could pay them \$300 he would let him go. Damm, so he says, handed over \$300, which was all he could get together, and the men left him.

The affair was not reported to the city police at the time, but Damm became mixed up in a law suit in Port Huron, and it is said his lawyers there promised to see justice done. The case dragged along until a few weeks ago, when the Canadian authorities got wind of it, with the above results.

It is said that Colwell is willing to go on the stand and give evidence against the other man, whoever he may be. He paid only \$20 to his assistant, he says.

Rounds, the man just arrested, was formerly a county constable. He is in jail, and appears to be unable to get the \$2,000 bail demanded.

The case has aroused much interest in this district, where Rounds' arrest was a great surprise.

#### BIGGEST SHIPS IN WORLD.

Titanic and Olympic Longer Than Mauretania.

New York, Oct. 27.—The White Star liners Titanic and Olympic, according to announcement made by the officials of the line here, will be in commission on the New York, Plymouth, Cherbourg and Southampton service in about two years, and will be the bigest and finest ships, although not the swiftest, in the world. They will be 600 feet long, or seventy feet longer than the Cunarder Mauretania, the biggest ship afloat, and will have a speed of about twenty-two knots in all kinds of weather, two knots in the fifty-foot graybacks of the cyclonic seas.

#### Girl Instantly Killed.

Eganville, Ont., Oct. 27.—The four-year-old daughter of Amiel Platt, section foreman at Locksley, was instantly killed Monday morning at that place by the Grand Trunk train from Pembroke. The child was crossing the track to its mother who was milking on the opposite side, and was not noticed on account of the heavy fog this morning, which prevented the trainmen from seeing any distance ahead. The body was badly mangled, the head, one arm and a foot being completely severed.

#### Fever Caused by Shellfish.

Belfast, Oct. 17.—A feature of the report of the Belfast health commission, which was issued, yesterday, is the large proportion of enteric or typhoid fever constantly present in the city. For the last twenty-five years the death rate from enteric fever has been fifty per cent. greater in Belfast than in other cities. This excess of enteric fever is attributed to the practice of the working class of gathering cockles and mussels from the polluted foreshore of Belfast Lough and eating them raw.

According to Assistant Commissioner Black, the population of Windsor, Ont., has increased 40%. The total population is 15,819. The total value of real property, is given as \$8,086,325, an increase of \$418,950.
