Breach of Promise Suit—Test Action to Be Followed by Three Others if the Jilted Plaintiff Wins.

Dixon, Ill., Oct. 27.—Five young women, all of them prominent socially here, looked wistfully at Arthur R. Buzzell, teller in the state bank, when he appeared in court yesterday to defend a breach of promise suit for \$19,000 which Miss Nedra Garner, twenty years old, of Leaf River, began against him.

Miss Thompson, who now is Mrs. Buzzell, didn't get four evenings of her husband's time to Miss Garner's use, when he was courting her. It was the fifth day after he would appear again and pass the evening with her. Not until Buzzell married Miss Ethel Thompson on the same day that Miss Garner expected to become his bride, the plaintiff testified, did the lady who had been in the intervening evenings.

The attorney for the defendant bowed the witness a release which she admitted she had signed. In fact, three other breach of promise suits hinge on the outcome of the present action, which was begun as a sort of test case.

Following her testimony there was a long argument between opposing counsel. The attorney for the defendant maintained that the suit ought to be dismissed, as Miss Garner had accepted \$200 in settlement of her claim for damages. The lawyer for the plaintiff contended the plaintiff was mentally unsound and in the care of a physician when she accepted the \$200 and signed the release.

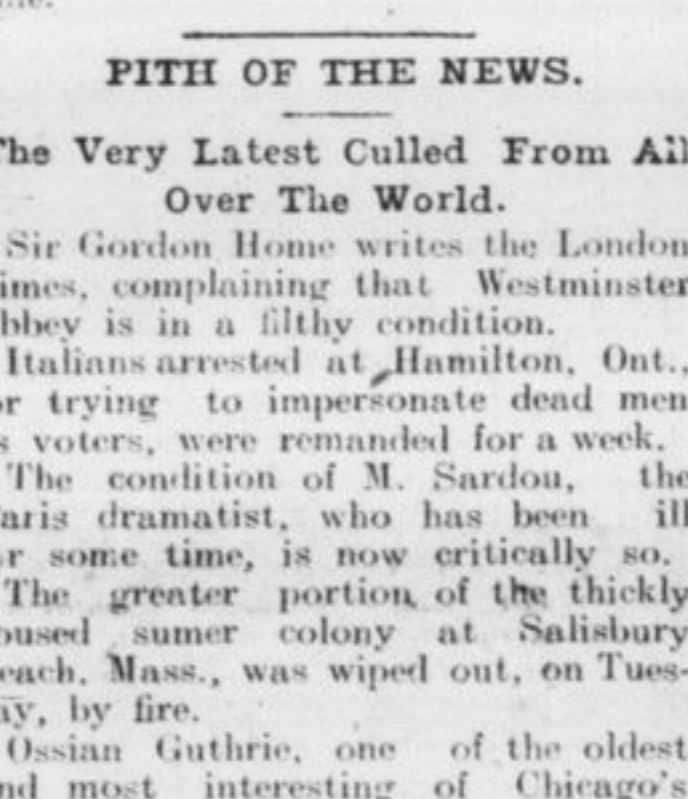
RESULTS BEING SEEN.

Bulgaria Urged to Renew Friendly Negotiations.

Paris, Oct. 27.—La Liberte publishes a Constantinople despatch stating that the results of the great military efforts of the past two weeks are now manifesting themselves. The second and third army corps have received their contingents of reserves from the active army. The concentration in Asia Minor is proceeding at Monastir and the garrison of Constantinople will be composed within a few days of troops exclusively devoted to the new regime.

The foreign office learned, yesterday, that the French, British and Russian ministers, at Sofia, have urged Bulgaria to renew friendly negotiations with Turkey and it is expected direct official steps to that end will be taken immediately.

Naoum Pasha, the Turkish ambassador to France, publishes a statement in the Temps, saying that despite the increasing alarm expressed in many quarters the Pacific intention of Turkish government has not varied. Although we are conscious of our strength, the ambassador says, we will not declare war.

TO BE PROTESTED

ELECTION OF BRISTOL WILL BE ATTACKED.

Gathering Evidence to Void the Election—Money Was Used to Buy Votes—Seeking For Missing Men.

Toronto, Oct. 27.—The election of Edmund Bristol, conservative, in Centre Toronto, likely will be protested. T. C. Robinette, the defeated candidate, said that his partners, Messrs. Godfrey and Pichler, were now gathering evidence which they thought would furnish ample cause for voiding of the election.
