NO MEETING CALLED

THE CITY COUNCIL DIDN'T HAVE QUORUM.

Eleven Members Were Present—One More Was Needed—No Business Had Been Prepared.

The city council was unable to transact any business last evening, as a quorum of members failed to attend. At a quarter past eight o'clock one more alderman was required to constitute a quorum, but the needed party failed to appear. These eleven were present when the city clerk called the roll: Aldermen Angrove, Carson, Craig, Couper, Free, Givens, Graham, Hart, Kent, Nickle and Robertson. Mayor Ross was at Cobden, the home of his father, who is seriously ill. There was practically nothing before the council as the committees had not met during the past week. The finance committee was to have taken up the vaccination question, but it had no quorum at its meeting last Friday evening, so there was nothing to report. It is possible that a special meeting will be called for next Monday evening. Arrangements were made for the passing of the accounts.

Road Re-building.

The blocks on Montreal street, between Princess and Ordnance streets, are being rebuilt, and will be the last of the road rebuilding this year. That stretch of road has long been in bad condition, especially the brick between Princess and Queen streets. The gateway to the Windsor hotel, being so high above the road level, has caused an unsightly condition. The place is now to be thoroughly drained, so that there will be a vast improvement.

At The City Dome.

It gives the people a sensation of delight to see men at work removing the ruined base of the city buildings dome, after three months' delay. Half a dozen carpenters have been working on the buildings, and the unsightly ruin will soon have disappeared. The work cannot proceed any too quickly. Contractor MacFarlane will rush things ahead, and try to complete the new dome by February.

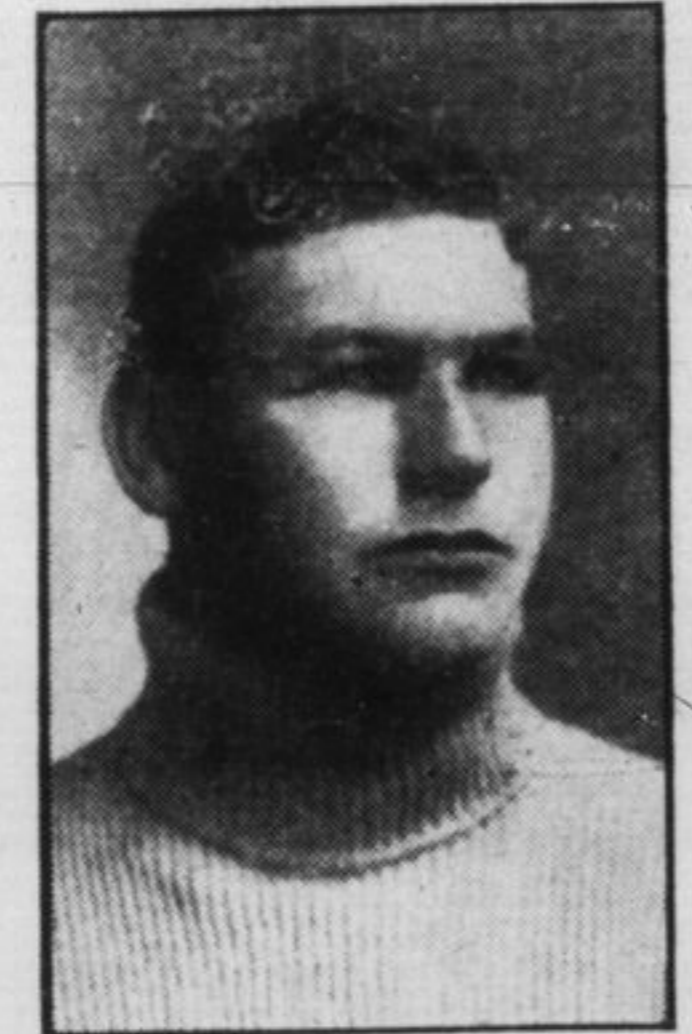

Edwin Elliott of Queen's Senior Rugby Team.

Edward Elliott, outside wing for Queen's senior rugby team is undoubtedly the best man in the Intercollegiate Union, today. His work this season has made an enviable record for him, and Queen's owe much to him for their victories this season. Elliott, who is a King-ton boy, started his active football career about four years ago with the Collegiate, playing inside wing. Later he played on the half back division, and last season when he entered Queen's he easily caught a place, playing right half. He plays a cool steady game on the half, and can always be counted on. This season he tried outside wing and showed up better there than ever.

To play the outside wing position a man needs speed and good tackling abilities. Elliott possesses both, and has the weight. He has the size and it has been proved on the field it takes an extra good man to handle him, a better man than has marked him as yet. Elliott uses the dive tackle when possible, and has it down to a science. Unless one uses this tackle properly the tackler is liable to suffer more than the tackled in the fall, but the Queen's man always comes out on top. When he dives for a man he hits him like a stone wall, just about the neck like a vice, the man generally goes down and goes down hard. He is a sure catch and can punt well when occasion demands.

Elliott is at present suffering from a bad knee due to a few falls on the hard ground, and will not do much practicing this week. He will probably be in line on Saturday against McGill.
