HAVE A MACHINE

IT HAS BEEN WORKING IN MANITOBA. How Roblin Government Ran Things—The Line-Up of the Candidates—Explosion Was Handy.

Winnipeg Free Press. The outstanding feature on the Manitoba battlefield of this dominant campaign is the fact that in all the ten constituencies of this province the conservative contests are under the control of the Roblin-Rogers machine, to the disgust of great numbers of conservatives.

It is with the methods of the provincial Tammany that the conservative campaign is being carried on throughout Manitoba. The cohorts of political workers on the province's payroll are busy as they were busy in the provincial campaign, the Tammany war chest is replenished with money raised at the expense of the people of Manitoba.

The line-up of the machine candidates includes: Probes—Magistrate Daly, Mr. Haggart, vacant of the chairmanship of the liquor commission was announced only the night before last, after the liquor license-holders had their "contributions" to the campaign fund sweated out of them; Mr. Lariviere, who has been transferred from his job in the east as an "immigration agent" on the provincial payroll to be the machine candidate in Provencher; Glen Campbell, a member of the machine majority of the legislature, who is the machine candidate in Dauphin; and so on through the list, those candidates who are not actually of the staff of the machine being amenable to the orders of the machine.

Messrs. Roblin, Rogers and Campbell have taken previous good care not to run any risks themselves by taking nominations. They are clinging tight to the provincial power from which they came so near being dislodged last year; of the total of 60,412 votes cast in the provincial constituencies, 31,067 were cast for, and 29,345 against, the Roblin government's candidates.

But if the conservative party were to carry the country in the approaching elections, Messrs. Roblin, Rogers and Co., with their command of the political machinery they have constructed, would seize upon the control in the west, and there would be inaugurated in the administration of federal affairs, in this section of the dominion the demoralization and demerit that have characterized the present provincial regime.

It is for the electors in all the ten Manitoba constituencies to declare by their ballots whether this is what they desire.

Canadian Woollen Trade. Montreal Herald. The Canadian woollen manufacturers kept up such energetic remonstrances that in 1905 the duty on woollen manufactures was increased to 30 per cent, as against 15 per cent, prior to 1905. This is not the average duty on woollens, but the maximum duty on manufactures. This seems a pretty heavy barrier for a colony to put against the manufactures of the mother country, yet we now find from the proceedings of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at their convention, held September 15, that unless this duty is increased the woollen industry is doomed. They made the most urgent representations to Sir Wilfrid Laurier not to dissolve the Canadian parliament until something had been done to give relief to the threatened industry. Sir Wilfrid Laurier very wisely replied that he could not legislate upon so important a matter in the short time at his disposal, because the needs of the whole population would have to be considered before any change could be made in a tariff.

Canada in Fiction. Canada-West for October has a striking article by Arthur Stringer, in which the authors who make a specialty of Canadian stories are shown in their faults. Kipling, Sir Gilbert Parker, Jack London, Stewart Edward White, Rex Beach, Richard Harding Davis, William DeMorgan and several other eminent writers who have been exploiting Canada as a barren waste of prairie, snows populated by a sparse mixture of heroes and men and women of hard morals or of morals whatever, are quoted freely and their misconceptions shown, in contrast with the Canada of fact. The article discloses in sharp relief an ignorance of climate, geography, history, law, and pretty much everything else relating to Canada, on the part of these and other distinguished gentlemen—and some almost equally distinguished women. Credit is given the writers who know the truth about Canada, and write it with that in mind, but it is remarkable how few they are.

The Canadian with a respectable knowledge of his own country soon awakens to the fact that there are two Canadas. One is the Canada of fact. The other is the Canada that comes out of ink-wells. It may be claimed, of course, that misrepresentation of Canada began with its discovery, when the St. Lawrence was written down as the true road to China. Very much the same extenuation of geography can explain how three shiploads of fresh water were sent out from England to the garrison of Kingston during the war of 1812 when the very stones of the fort were lapped by the pure blue waters of Lake Ontario.

Rev. Dr. Eber Crumphy, discussing the theatre in Toronto expressed the hope that one modern theatre would pass away, and that the future would develop an institution where only plays of a high educational and entertaining character would be presented to theatre-goers.
