ABOUT FOREST FIRES LEGISLATION IS NEEDED TO PREVENT THEM.

What Should Be Done—Some Things Should Be Forbidden and Persons and Railways Should Be Compelled to Do Other Things. Written by A. T. Drummond, L.L.D. Forest fires are preventable. They occur chiefly in August and September.

Every settler, lumberman, railway contractor or railway company when clearing land should under a penalty: Be forbidden to set fire to any standing tree or any stump over four feet high, or to any stump or brushwood nearer than twenty-five feet from any standing tree or trees.
