Forest fires are preventable. They occur chiefly in August and September. Hot weather and lessened rain do not furnish the cause, but merely supply conditions under which they spread more rapidly. The fires, with rare exceptions of lighting, are traceable to sparks from locomotives or factories, to railway contractors and the city on a business trip.
