**AGAIN BEAT CADETS**  
**QUEEN'S III. WON OUT BY 32 TO 9.**

Will Now Meet Varsity Juniors—Why Queen's Seniors Decided Not to Play the Tigers in Hamilton.

Queen's III played a return game with Cadets II on the latter's campus Friday afternoon and defeated them 10 to 8. This gives Queen's total score being 32 to 9. The teams lined up the same as on the previous day, and played better ball. Cadets made a better showing against Queen's when they were on their own grounds and had the crowd to back them. The teams lined up as follows:

Queen's—George, full-back; Goodwin, Macdonnell, Ramsay, halves; Kirkpatrick, quarter; Ramsay, Barker, Read, scrummage; Spearman, Battersby, inside wings; De Brassy, Hamilton, second out; Connolly, Lee, outside wings.

Cadets—Gordon, full-back, Watts, Nordheimer, Adams, halves; Wheeler, quarter; Dunbar, Tish, inside wings; Stewart, Wright, outside wings; Dal, Peter, outside wings; Hanson, McPherson, outside wings.

This gives Queen's the round and they will meet Varsity in the first round of the semi-finals. They should win out easily.

**Won't Play in Hamilton.**  
Queen's seniors will not play in Hamilton on Thanksgiving Day, but it is not because they have "backed down," as the Hamilton papers stated. They cannot play for two reasons. The Tigers have arranged another game for that date, and Queen's want to wait, as they may have to play them for the dominion championship, as they expect to be champions of the intercollegiate series. This game for the dominion title would be a great game and Hamilton would not have any walk-over. There are men on Queen's line as good as on Hamilton's. The Tigers have not a better half than Macdonnell, as good a punter as Williams, or a better outside wing than Elliott. The game would have taken place on Thanksgiving Day had not the challenge been sent in by the C.I.R.F.U. to the Big Four.

**The McGill Teams.**  
According to the Montreal Herald, McGill senior rugby team which plays Queen's this afternoon, is a bit crippled. Capt. Black cannot play. McGill soccer team arrived here last night, but the senior and intermediate rugby teams did not reach here till one o'clock this afternoon.

This year the games will be played on the grounds of the Interprovincial and Inter-Collegiate Unions, which will probably mean Hamilton (The Tigers win), and Kingston (if Queen's win.)

The Collegiate team played the Maple Leafs a friendly game at the Cricket field, this morning. Last season two teams played a game the Collegiate winning five to four, and this year a closer game is expected.

For the past two days there have been rumors of a protest against the election of Mr. Hartly on the grounds of bribery. After June 8th last the general opinion seemed to be that the conservative leaders in Kingston should not talk about bribery. The general opinion also is that the friends of Mr. Hartly didn't need to spend one dollar to elect him, as his seat was quite safe. The tory organ is opposed to a protest (which seems only a bluff, anyway), no doubt because it knows something about the tory doings in last Monday's election. If a protest did come to a head several leading conservatives' actions late last Sunday night would be exposed, and their wives might be suspicious of their visits to certain places.
