Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody

Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

F. A. Hamilton died suddenly in a Hamilton restaurant.

A single volley from a loyal battalion quelled a mutiny among the Turkish troops at Constantinople.

Conductor Ames Wells, of the Grand Trunk, was run over and killed, on Monday in the point St. Charles yard.

Hon. Mr. Hanna, the provincial secretary, has cancelled the license recently issued to the Caer-Howell hotel, Toronto.

An attempt was made in Buffalo on Saturday to pass forged checks drawn on the Market branch of the Dominion Bank, Toronto.

The Dutch government, to-day, ordered a blockade of Venezuelan ports. The blockade of the harbor at Caracas is said already to be ineffectual.

Saved from the big four-masted schooner, Lala L. Pollard, after she burned, Capt. Powell and his crew of nine were landed at New York, to-day.

Mrs. Miller, West London, had her thumb so injured while leading a call by a rope, the animal running away, that she had to have the member amputated.

At Watford, Ont., the official count for East Lambton was made, to-day, before Returning Officer W. S. Fuller. Armstrong, conservative, has a majority of 400.

Lord Milner arrived in Montreal on Monday morning and at a special convocation of McGill university, in the Royal Victoria College, was given the honorary degree of L.L.D.

A man about thirty-five years of age was found dead in his room at Cook's Hotel, Toronto, this morning. The gas was on full, and asphyxiation was the cause of death. The man was registered as Charles Riordan, Buffalo, At. Ga., Ont.

At Galt, Ont., George Miller, aged fifty-five, was found in her home, Saturday, unconscious from the effects of escaping coal gas from the furnace caused. It is claimed by the chimney being stopped up. She died at the hospital, this morning.

David Hobbes, at one time a customs official for the C.P.R. at Montreal, sent to penitentiary for seven years for making false pretences and defrauding the government out of thousands of dollars, was recently released on ticket of leave. He was run over by a C.P.R. train Saturday night and died at the western hospital.

CIVILIANS FINED.

They Disturbed the Peace By Breaking Windows. Toronto, Nov. 2.—In the police court, this morning, the three young men arrested, on Saturday, charged with stone throwing and creating a disturbance, were let off with easy sentences of \$1 and costs or ten days in jail. The fines were paid.

FIRE AT WINDSOR BEACH.

Cottages Destroyed in Rochester Summer Resort. Rochester, N.Y., Nov. 2.—Thirty-six cottages at Windsor Beach, a summer resort of Rochester on Lake Ontario, about seven miles from the city, were completely destroyed by fire, Saturday afternoon, entailing a loss estimated at \$117,000. The cottages formed a strip along the lake front and only four in the street were saved. All of the cottages were owned by Rochester citizens. The fire started from an oil heater in an old frame cottage, and, as there was no facilities for fighting fire and a high wind was blowing, it spread with remarkable rapidity.

COULD NOT LAND

And a Pilot Had to Go on to England. Montreal, Nov. 2.—Considerable damage is reported from the lower St. Lawrence as the result of the great gale which has been sweeping over land and sea for the past couple of days. The boat, the *Clare*, was wrecked at Rousseau Anne and the schooner *Volteigues* at Tadoussac. The outward-bound *Allen* could not land her pilot at Father Point, owing to heavy sea, and he had to go to England in consequence while the inward *Kensington* failed to get a pilot for the same reason.

For The Loss Of A Trunk.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Despite the fact that the Canadian Transfer company binds itself to be responsible for nothing more than \$20 in the loss of a trunk, Henry Lamont, Chicago, on an appeal to the divisional court, here, was rewarded judgment on Saturday for \$157.35 against the company for the loss of a trunk said to contain a large amount of jewelry. The article came by boat from Clayton, N.Y., and was turned over to the Canadian Transfer company, who gave the regular check for it. The owner was on his honeymoon. Their lordships, Chief Justice Falconbridge and Justice Ed- jell reversed judgment by Chancellor Boyd, which was in favor of the defendants, and awarding the plaintiff damages, criticized the validity of any law allowing a carrying company to escape full responsibility by getting consignees to endorse the clauses printed on the agreement form.

Coal Was On Fire.

Coal on Anglin's dock caught fire at 1:37 o'clock, on Sunday afternoon, and made a lively blaze, which required the attention of the firemen for three hours. Spontaneous combustion was the cause of the fire.

PERJURY UNPROVEN AND GANANOQUE YOUNG MAN ACQUITTED.

Captain of Schooner Took Ill and Craft Put in to Garden Island—Gananoque to Have a Bigger Skating Rink.

Gananoque, Nov. 2.—D. J. McLennan, Pictou, son of Mr. and Mrs. James McLennan, Brock street, charged with perjury at the elections, at Brockville, on Monday last, appeared in court here on Saturday morning. The case was dismissed, there being no evidence of any perjury.

The coal schooner *Briton*, which left here the forepart of last week, for Solus, N.Y., had to lay to at Garden Island, on account of the illness of her captain, and on Friday afternoon Frank Seymour, Water street, left to join her and navigate the craft to her destination.

The funeral of the late William Yule took place, Sunday afternoon, to Willowbank cemetery. The funeral was largely attended, deceased having been a resident of this section for more than fifty years. Rev. Henry Gracey, pastor of St. Andrew's church, conducted the obsequies.
