Cambon, French ambassador at Berlin, with Herr Von Schoen. the German foreign secretary, in which the French representative has sought to persuade Herr Von Schoen to induce Austria to meet Russia in friendly negotiations. It is realized now that the question of German diplemacy obliterates the idea of all secondary pour pariers on the Balkan



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
