THE NEWS OF WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Prince Edward Island elections are to take place fifteen days hence.

China has granted the Dalai Lama a salary and ordered him to return home.

New Brunswick is to consider the question of provincial prohibition at the next session of the legislature.

The historic old Agnes street Methodist church, Toronto, has been sold for a Jewish synagogue for \$21,000.

The conference of cotton workers, at Manchester, ended without a settlement of great strike being reached.

Oslo Allen was killed in a Kentucky feud incited by eight barrels of election whiskey shipped into Camp Junction.

The Ontario Women's Christian Temperance Union meeting, at Barrie, passed a strong resolution in favor of woman suffrage.

Secretary of Agriculture Wilson is declared to have declined the presidency of Colorado Agricultural College at Fort Collins.

Daniel Carter, a Guelph township farmer, was struck on the head while driving through an archway and is partially paralyzed.

The Prince of Wales has sent a donation of \$250 to Aberdeen Infirmary in recognition of the treatment of his servant, the late Finlay Cameron.

It is expected that through trains will be running from St. Paul to Vancouver over the Victoria, Vancouver & Eastern railroad before the end of 1909.

R. E. Noble, working out a sentence of ten days on the rock pile at Spokane, Wash., will be sent to Ottawa, Ont., where is wanted for forgery.

A Pittsburg man travelled this week on a railway ticket issued thirty-nine years ago. The conductor hesitated at first and telegraphed for instructions, but was ordered to honor it.

The Farmers' Bank management, Toronto, have discovered a shortage of \$12,000 to \$17,000 in the accounts of D. Cameron McCallum, the teller, who admits having speculated with the money.

Persian nationalists exiled in Paris are appealing to the powers to allow the Persian parliament to work out its own salvation, and not to lend the country any money, as it would only be squandered on the passions and pleasures of the court.

Clerks in the Eastern Townships bank, at Marieville, Que., had a lively fight with robbers, whom they surprised at work on the bank. One of the clerks was wounded in the head, but they drove the desperadoes away.

Mrs. May Ackwright Hutton, wife of a millionaire mining operator in Spokane, will pick ten of the most beautiful girls in the state of Washington to canvass the city after the national election in the interest of equal suffrage.

NATURALISTS' CLUB

Of Queen's Hears An Address By A. B. Klugh.

At the meeting of the Queen's University Naturalists' Club, which was held on Tuesday evening, ten new members were elected, and action was taken to get in touch with naturalist clubs, if such exist, at McGill and Varsity.

The address of the evening was delivered by the president, A. B. Klugh, on "One of Our Earliest Naturalists—Gilbert White." The speaker first gave a brief biographical sketch of Gilbert White, saying that he was born at Selborne, Hampshire county, England, in 1730, and lived all his life there except when at school and at Oxford.

He was a curate in the neighborhood of Selborne, from 1755 till his death in 1793. We know him chiefly through his book "The Natural History of Selborne," which was published in 1789, and which consisted largely of letters to Thomas Pennant, who was the author of "Arctic Zoology," "British Zoology" and many other works, and who is commemorated in our Canadian fauna by the name of the fisher, one of the weasel family, "Mustela pennanti." White's language is to our ears quaint, with him "a fine morning" was "a delicate morning," and the speaker read some passages illustrating his quaint style.

His book abounds in quotations from Virgil and other Latin poets, from Greek authors and from the Scriptures, thereby differing greatly from modern writers on natural history. Many of his descriptions were very appropriate as his reference to the golden-crowned kinglet as "that shadow of a bird" and to its note being "as minute as its person."

The speaker read a passage on the flight of birds and remarked that this as well as many other passages showed White to be a remarkably keen observer, White was never dogmatic, but adhered to his idea which is the same held by all good naturalists that candour and openness are the very life of natural history.

Mr. Klugh remarked that Gilbert White was a type of the old general naturalist—the studied birds, mammals, insects, fishes, reptiles, amphibians, plants, rocks and meteorology. This was possible in White's day when natural science was not far advanced, and when a man could soon become conversant with all the books upon the subject, but was quite impossible, to-day, when to accomplish anything a man must specialize and that not only in one subject, as for instance, botany, but in one branch of that subject, as plant physiology, or plant anatomy, or systematic botany.

That White was not a mere recorder, but a philosophical naturalist was shown by several passages particularly one in which he gave reasons why the domestic pigeon must have been descended from the rock pigeon, and this was exactly the same conclusion to which Darwin came after thoroughly investigating this subject.

The speaker said that the older naturalists were generally thought to believe that animals were guided entirely by instinct, and had no reasoning power, but White, while he laid great stress on instinct held that animals reasoned.

The speaker took up many of White's views on various other topics and compared them with the views held to-day, and in each case showed that they were in the main point the same.

The next meeting of the club will be held in the honour botanical library, old arts building, on November 17th, at 8 p.m., and the club desires its friends in the city to feel that they will be welcomed at this and all its meetings.

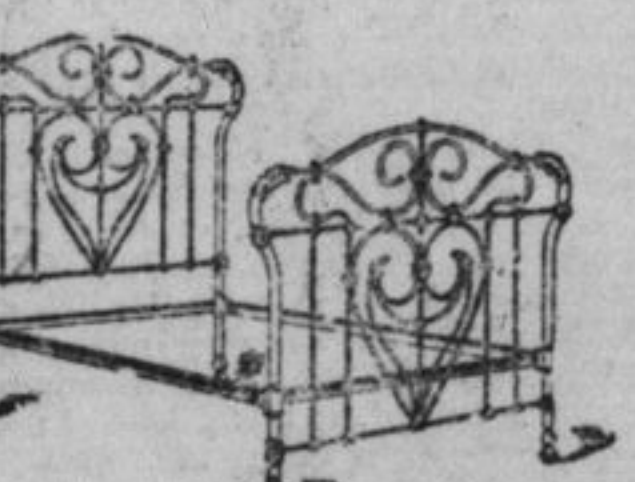
