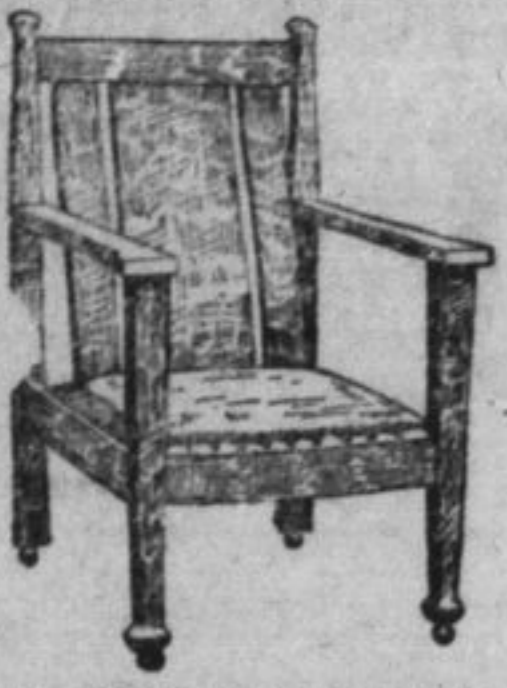

AN AWFUL CONDITION CATTLE DRINK FROM POOLS OF SEWAGE.

Prompt Action of the Board of Works Needed—The City Engineer Outlines the Road Rebuilding Scheme For Next Year.

The facts of a most unsanitary condition in the northern part of the city came before the Board of Works at its meeting yesterday afternoon. The matter arose out of a complaint by Miss Matthews that the sewer on Division Street south of Russell Street, overflowed on her property, which runs from Division to Montreal street a distance of 1,900 feet, and was causing a nuisance.

The city engineer submitted a plan of macadam road improvement for next year. He advised continuing the type of road built this year, which is the best possible. The sum of \$12,500 would be needed, for which a by-law would have to be passed in January, as was done a year ago.

The petition for the opening of Mack street to Victoria street was referred to the city engineer for an estimate of the cost. The city solicitor was instructed to write the owners to repair the crib work at the foot of William street.

City solicitor McIntyre recommended no action on the claim of William Macnamara for damages to his home on William street, through the blowing down of a maple tree about Oct. 15. No action was accordingly taken.

The city solicitor advised as to the right of the city to allow peanut stands on the streets. He pointed out that it was advisable or not for the owners to be allowed on the streets. City engineer Craig reported as to the street grates. He put in a new grate would cost several thousand dollars. He advised that the grates be flushed twice during the summer.
