

BURGLARS CAPTURED FOR DEEDS COMMITTED IN BROCKVILLE.

The Men Intended to Operate in the Capital—Sir Wilfrid Laurier Will Not Likely Sit For Ottawa.

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—The Ottawa police made a clever capture, yesterday afternoon, when they landed the two men guilty of the burglaries in Brockville, and doubtless spoiled the plans of the men who intended to operate on Ottawa stores, last night.

The men are: Stewart Gray, formerly of Ottawa, twenty-two years of age, and E. W. Harrington, who was registered at a local hotel under the name of William Wilson, aged twenty-five. A number of revolvers and other goods stolen in Brockville were found on the prisoners, and then Gray confessed. It is thought that Harrington is the leader and that he may have been connected with the recent Toronto burglaries. He had a star of the Toronto police constables. They will be taken to Brockville by Chief Burke, who arrived this morning.

It is generally accepted here that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will not sit for Ottawa, thus Emmanuel Tasse, Dr. Chevier and Auguste Lemieux are spoken of for liberal candidates in January. Dr. Chevier was the choice of the original convention and made way for the premier. The conservatives await the liberal choice or they talk of contesting the bye-election in Carleton county there will be an election, too, for the seat held by R. L. Borden and it is doubtful if the conservative choice will return to E. Kidd, who resigned originally to let Mr. Borden, when he was defeated in Halifax. Other names are talked of, but that of J. G. H. Bergeron, which was bruited, is almost impossible.

In the supreme court, to-day, Danseu vs. Danseu was concluded and judgment reserved. Laramee vs. Ferron-Ferron, from the superior court of Richelieu, was opened. It is reported that the hearing of Quebec appeals may be concluded next Tuesday.

The preliminary tremors of a severe earthquake were marked at the observatory at 2:31 a.m., and lasted nearly three hours. The distance is estimated to be about 3,700 miles away.

On Making Entrance to the Canadian Canal.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Nov. 6.—The steamer Wexford, down bound, and loaded with grain, struck the south pier on making the entrance to the Canadian canal, near the same place as the Lyman G. Smith did some time ago. She has a hole in her starboard side about a foot wide and six feet long above the water line. Temporary repairs are being made and the boat may get away to-day. Captain Sinclair, under the command of the Lyman G. Smith, left for here. The Wexford is a new boat in the trade and is managed by J. Bassett, Collingwood. Part of her cargo is being lightered.

Wanted For Theft of Church Money.

Brockville, Ont., Nov. 6.—Last August a farm hand named Roy Pemberton, in the employ of Albert E. Foster, a Kitley township farmer, departed suddenly, taking it is charged some \$140 in the treasury of a cash drawer. Foster was treasurer of one of the local churches, and it was the church money that was missing. Pemberton has just been located at Winnipeg and placed under arrest. Instructions have been sent back to hold him until an officer arrives from Brockville to bring the prisoner east for trial.

DEPUTIES IN FIGHT. Riotous Scenes Marked Conclusion of Ecuador's Congress.

Quito, Ecuador, Nov. 6.—The extraordinary session of the Ecuadoran congress has just been concluded with riotous scenes that ended in a serious fight. A number of the ministers, but particularly the minister of finance, were warmly attacked by the minority in the house, who accused them of being participants in extensive frauds. The supporters of the government retaliated by assaulting the minority deputies while they were leaving the congress, many of whom were wounded in the encounter.

WON TO HONESTY. An Operation on Lad With Bad Impulses.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 6.—At one Pegg, fourteen years old, on whom an operation was performed in the hope of removing an irresistible impulse to steal, was discharged from the Trinity Hospital, and returned to his home. Canada's Envoy Will Commence Negotiations. Ottawa, Nov. 6.—Dr. R. M. Coulter, the deputy postmaster-general, has arrived at Sydney, N.S.W., and to-morrow will commence his negotiations with the Commonwealth government at Melbourne, in regard to the position which Australia is likely to assume towards the "All-Red" line project. After his conference at Melbourne Dr. Coulter will have to go to Wellington, New Zealand, and will likely be back in Ottawa until and Great Britain, so that he is not afterwards pressed to South Africa March at the earliest.

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The city of Toronto, this afternoon, tendered a very hearty reception to the Sheffield choir, and afterwards took the visiting singers for a drive around the city. The most violent earthquake ever rified the inhabitants of the city on Friday morning. Houses were shaken and people fled in panic stricken to the streets. The large and specially designed memorial altar cross of St. Margaret's church, Spadina avenue, Toronto, has been stolen, and religious spite is said to have been responsible for the desecration. The police arrested, at Ottawa, two men, giving the names of Stewart Gray and Charles Kimball, having in their possession some of the booty of the half-dozen robbers perpetrated at Brockville on Tuesday night. The crisis between Germany and France has seemingly been dispelled over night. It is now apparent that Germany is ready to abandon her recent demand for the release of the German deserters arrested by French officials. There was a spectacular pitch-in between a switcher and an incoming freight in the west yards, Winnipeg, last night. Several cars were turned over and the wreckage caught fire. Fireman Flade, of the switcher, was badly scalded and bruised. Arthur Newman, serving the last year of a five year term for burglary, was found in his cell, at Vancouver, B.C., bleeding from the mouth. He died of heart failure and loss of blood. Newman caused his own death by chewing his tongue. That President Roosevelt may be the successor of Senator Platt in the senate, is considered by many in Washington as not at all improbable. The president is said to have intimated he would not be entirely averse to the acceptance of the senatorial office. Fire in the Bliss electrical school at Lakona, park, a suburb north of Washington, compelled nearly two hundred students to flee for their lives in their night clothing. The building was completely destroyed. All of the students are believed to have escaped, but lost all of their effects. Loss, \$50,000. As a result of a rear-end car collision between two Grand Trunk engines, at Bowmanville, Ont., on Thursday, two men are dead and two others are badly injured. The dead are: Robert Young, foreman, and J. G. Gauthier, pump repairer, riding on the engine, with his foreman, Robert Young. The injured are: William Rushworth, fireman, legs and back badly bruised, and Robert Young, right arm broken, and head badly cut. All the men belong to Belleville.
