London, Nov. 6.—Colossal hats are this autumn the rage in London. They are of the type known as the "Merry Widow"—somewhat reminiscent of a large, shallow inverted basin. Quite common are varieties of four and five feet in circumference. On the stage, however, hats are to be seen which put these completely in the shade. At the London Coliseum, Miss Maud Temple is wearing a hat which cost £120. It is fourteen feet in circumference and is trimmed with fifteen ermine feathers of old rose color, each measuring two yards. The feathers alone cost £100. Miss Temple's hat is absolutely the largest on record, and four feet larger than Miss Marie Lloyd's, and eight feet larger than that of Mrs. Marie Green. Miss Temple has quite a collection of hats, varying from six feet to ten feet, and needless to say, special boxes have had to be built for each.

Gown Of Mauve Messaline.
Mauve messaline was used for the gown illustrated—the model being made in semi-princess style—with a panel front and back. The yoke was of white tulle, mullinet, embroidered with light silver spangles, and the sleeves were of the tulle maline also.
