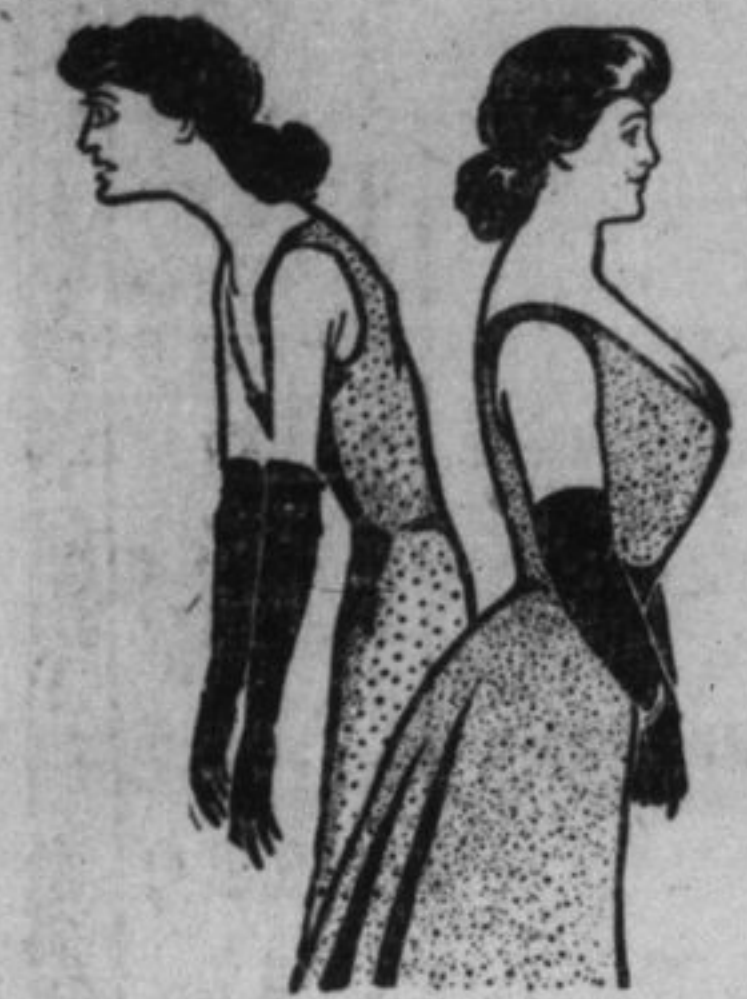

PRODEUR TO REMAIN AS MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES.

And Re-organize the Department - Hugh Allan congratulates Mr. Brodeur for Improving St. Lawrence Route.

Montreal, Nov. 10.—Hon. L. P. Brodeur, minister of marine and fisheries, like his illustrious leader, intends to stay and finish his work as head of the department. This was intimated by a group of business men on board the government steamer Lady Grey during a tour of inspection of the St. Lawrence channel from which the party returned yesterday. From time to time during the past few months there have been rumors that Mr. Brodeur would retire to the bench, more particularly since the opening of the investigation by Judge Cassels. During the course of the trip a speech was made by Hugh Allan congratulating the minister on what had been accomplished by the department for the improvement of the St. Lawrence route. In the course of his reply Mr. Brodeur made the remarks referred to above, intimating his intention to remain as minister and rehabilitate the department.

To Shield Mr. Gregory. Quebec, Nov. 10.—The investigation into the department of marine and fisheries re-opened this morning, in the criminal court. The first witness called was Mr. Holliday, of Holliday Bros. He stated that the firm's business with the department since the last four years was about \$45,000, and he promised to produce all the books this afternoon. W. G. Davie of Davie & Sons was examined. Mr. Davie stated that the firm of Davie & Sons had business with the department of marine and fisheries for about \$136,000, since 1907, and that he had paid during these eleven years an average of 500 a year to Mr. Gregory to secure his good will. These payments were made by cheques to cash, and he had special marks of his own written on the stubs of these cheques because he wanted to shield Mr. Gregory.

These annual payments of about \$500 made to Mr. Gregory, were not an account of interest on loans or discounts of drafts or on account of repayments. They were simply gifts made to Mr. Gregory in certain circumstances, when he was hard pressed for money on account of large disbursements he had to make according to the statement. But he declared that he did not charge the department more than he would a private concern. Some of his accounts were produced. He confessed that large accounts of over \$30,000 had been certified by Mr. Gregory without any discussion. They were granted as correct without discussion. Cheques of the same nature but for smaller amounts appear to have been paid by the witness to Beauchemin, Sorel, by a man named McConkey, superintendent of Hull, Pettit, engineer of the Montcalm, Captain O'Farrell, Lemieux, Noret, Gagne and Dufour, who have been suspended, will appear to explain their case to-morrow morning. O'Farrell has taken Mr. Brodeur as counsel, and the other four M. A. Lemieux.

NEWS OF DISTRICT.

The Tidings From Various Points in Eastern Ontario. On Wednesday morning Mrs. J. A. Bradley, Lansdowne, ill for some time with a lingering disease, passed quietly to her rest. She was always an active member of the Methodist church.

On Friday, at Brockville, James Sutherland, the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. William Sutherland, of Winnipeg, formerly of Brockville, was married to Ethel, second daughter of Mrs. John Jacobs.

Mrs. James Moore, a highly respected resident of New Dublin, died on Friday night, after a lingering illness. The deceased was seventy-two years of age, her maiden name being Miss Avery, Caintown.

A little daughter of George Spracklet, of Gilmour, was so innocently locked on Thursday, that she died. Some brush heaps were being burned and the child approached one of them too closely and her clothing caught fire. When assistance reached her she was so badly burned that death resulted.

Stopping Gentle Smuggling. Sault Ste. Marie, Nov. 10.—Smugglers are having their own troubles just now, and some gentlemen have had to undergo the customs sheds when they arrived from the Michigan Soo. Dressed in new clothes that looked suspiciously like American-made goods. On a couple of occasions the police have been called in when suspects showed an inclination to refuse to remove clothing or boots that the officers wished to examine.

Desertion Prevents Divorce. New York, Nov. 10.—Under a ruling of supreme court Justice Aspiras of Brooklyn, a wife who becomes tired of wedlock and leaves her husband simply for that reason, breaks the marriage contract and may get a divorce on the ground of infidelity, her desertion being consent to or connivance with the husband's subsequent errors.

MARINE NEWS.

What is Found About the Wharves. The schooner Ford River cleared, Tuesday morning, for Oswego.

The schooner Jamieson, from Oswego, is unloading coal at Anglin's.

The schooner Bertha Kalkins arrived from Oswego with coal for Sorel.

The steamer Rosedale passed on her way from Montreal, west, yesterday.

The steamer Regina passed Sunday, on her way to Montreal.

The steamship Mary Louise, loaded a general cargo here, for Rideau canal ports.

The schooner Winnie Wing, from Oswego, is unloading coal at Allison's, Wolfe Island.

Swift's Steamer Aletha, from Bay Point, schooner Cornelia, from Oswego, with coal; steamer Belleville, up, Saturday; steamer Pellatt, up, on Monday.

At Richardson's elevator: Steamer Lloyd Porter, loaded 22,000 bushels of wheat for Montreal; steamer Maggie L., loaded wheat for Montreal; steamer John Randall loaded wheat for Rideau canal ports.

At M. T. Co's elevator: The steamer Morley arrived from Duluth with 63,000 bushels of wheat; the steamer Nestling, from Fort William, with 67,000 bushels of wheat; steamer Neopawa, from Fort William, lighted cargo of 12,000 bushels of wheat, and cleared for Montreal; steamer John Duncan, from Duluth, with 47,000 bushels of wheat; the tug Mary P. Hall, cleared for Montreal; three light barges; tugs Emerson and Thomson, cleared for Montreal, with three grain-barges each.

Tug Hackett Ashore. The tug Hackett went ashore on Monday morning at Weaver's Point, near Aultsville, while on her way to Kingston, with two light barges. She followed the point too closely, with the result that she went on. The tug Florence worked at her but was unsuccessful and last night the tug Frontenac, of the Calvin company, was sent to the scene.

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Feed, Kimble, formerly of Galt, who, last week, pleaded guilty to bigamy, appeared before Judge Sniham at Hamilton, and was sentenced to three years with hard labor in the penitentiary.

The steamer Rosemount, down-bound and grain laden, stranded while making the entrance to the new channel at West Neeshish. Tugs were unable to release her. The work of lightening has commenced.

Enough definite returns are at hand from the vote on the divorce law referendum to show that the state has put the seal of disapproval upon the old statute, which has made South Dakota notorious as a "divorce mill."

Charles M. Johnson, London, Eng., who two years ago was rated as being worth upwards of \$20,000, to-day, swore under oath that he had not enough money or securities left from his vast fortune to pay his debts.

Sir J. J. Duveen, head of the art firm of Duveen Bros., London, Eng., died Monday. Knighthood was conferred on Mr. Duveen on June 25th for his presentation to the nation last year of a new wing to the Tate Art Gallery.

F. W. Thompson, vice-president and managing director of the Ogilvie Flour Mills company, limited, estimates that the money value of the various agricultural products of the three western provinces of the dominion will reach this year the large sum of \$125,000,000.

A temporary writ was issued, this morning, to unseat members of the finance committee of Montreal. The ground on which the writ is issued is that they paid expenses of the mayor and secretary on a recent trip to Paris, without sufficient authority.

Thomas Elliott Brantford, is seeking \$100,000 damages from the Windsor, Essex & Lake Shore Electric railway. Elliott claims he got the contract for the construction of the road three years ago, and later it was awarded to another firm.

Lord Sholto Douglas, youngest son of the eighth Marquis of Queensberry, is under arrest at Creston, charged with attempted murder. Lord Sholto owns a fruit shop near the city.

Upon receiving unexpectedly, found a man therein, who refused to go when told.

The stabbing affray between Italians on Chaudiere dam was up at Hull police court, but little progress was made. The affray is alleged to be a black hand outrage and all the Italian witnesses have skipped in fear.

FATHER MACDONALD URGES His Congregation to Obey the Commands of the State. At Portsmouth on Sunday Rev. Father McDonald preached an eloquent sermon on the text—"Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's." This was a command to all to observe and to be obedient to constituted authority. How necessary is this injunction at the present time. The presence of smallpox, the speaker said, is a grave danger to the well-being of the community. For the prevention and extermination of this foul disease the patient labor of science, divinely guided, has found a remedy as firmly established as any scientific fact. In the year 1874 the German government issued a command that all citizens of Germany should be vaccinated, and smallpox has ceased to exist in the fatherland. And yet, said Father McDonald, there are scoffers, and Pharisees to-day, who set up their opinion against constituted authority, who flout their ignorance against the light gleaned through the centuries of faithful research. They may gain, it is true, a little momentary popularity, but what is it but the notoriety of a coxcomb. In earnest language the reverend Father exhorted his hearers to be submissive to the command of the state. Vaccination was a duty incumbent on all for the well-being of society, and he felt satisfied that all his hearers would cheerfully perform their obligation in this respect. "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's."
