Many persons fancy that raw apples are indigestible and only endurable in the early morning. Doubtless the old adage that fruit is gold in the morning. silver in the middle of the day and lead at night is to some extent answerable for this erroneous impression.

Dietitians say that ripe, raw apples contain more phosphates in proportion to their bulk than any other article of food, fish not excepted. A recent writ-er on this point boldly declares that in this lies the secret of healthful longevity. They correct biliousness and act as a sedative upon the racked nerves

and allay insomnia "Eat uncooked apples constantly, al-though, of course, in moderation, and drink distilled water only and years evidences of age will be long in com-


