




### CITY COUNCIL MEETING

#### GRANT MADE FOR DAMAGE BY FALLING TREE.

The Council Refuses to Invite a Suit By J. B. Cooke—City Engineer's Macadam Road Report—Special Meeting to Be Held.

The city council had an hour and twenty minute session last evening. Only routine business was transacted. A special meeting is likely to be called to consider the road pavement question. There were present at last evening's session, Mayor Ross and Aldermen Angrove, Carson, Chown, Couper, Craig, Elliott, Free, Graham, Kent, McCann, McCartney, Nickle, Toye, and Hoag. These communications were referred to committees:

Hon. William Hartly wrote the council enclosing a letter from Col. Fiset, deputy minister of militia, regarding the placing of Cedar island at the disposal of the city. Col. Fiset asked the council to let him know if it wished to take the island on the conditions offered last April, viz., building a wharf, maintaining a ferry and keeping a caretaker on the island.

Jessie M. Bell, secretary Y.W.C.A., re snow removal from sidewalk entrance Y.W.C.A. residence, 196 Johnson street. M. S. Calback asking for removal of tree in front of his house on Alfred street.

City Engineer asking for appointment of city chimney sweep.

Dr. Frederick Etherington tendering his resignation from the local Board of Health.

J. L. Whiting asking for title to lots 1 and 62 York street.

Captain Daryaw complaining re Captain swing bridge that it is not opened as it should be, and that it does not show lights.

City Engineer stating that contract re O'Kell street sewer has been completed by Capt. Lesslie.

A. Mand Mills and others for waterworks extension on Aberdeen street, presented by Ald. Craig.

J. Perryman and others for the sewer on York street, presented by Ald. Graham.

T. W. Reid asking for drain on Earl street.

Kingston Poultry and Pet Stock Association asking for grant of \$50.

E. R. Beckwith for permission to put two prism lights in the sidewalk opposite the store R. J. Carson is erecting above Medley's Drug Store.

Thomas Hewitt resigning his position as waterworks superintendent and asking to be relieved at the end of the year.

Board of Works Matters. The Board of Works, on the advice of the city solicitor, recommended no action on the request of William McNamee, 33 Upper William street, for compensation for damage through a tree falling on his house.

Ald. Elliott and Graham thought that Wm. McNamee should receive some compensation, as the tree belonged to the city.

Ald. Elliott said that the tree may have been in a dangerous condition before it was blown down, and hence it was the duty of the corporation to have had it removed.

On motion of Ald. Free, seconded by Ald. McCartney, the council voted Mr. McNamee \$15, which amount the city engineer said would repair the damage.

Ald. Nickle stated that the council would have half a dozen similar requests.

Another recommendation of the Board of Works was that no action be taken on the communication of Joseph Cooke, asking compensation for damages sustained by his horse and cutter, owing to the condition of Princess street on March 5th, last, that the city waive its statutory defence as to the writ not having been issued.

Ald. Graham said that the city should settle with Mr. Cooke, who was out \$100. The Board of Works was willing to give Mr. Cooke \$50, but the latter wanted \$100.

Ald. Craig thought that the council shouldn't invite a suit, and Ald. Carson held the same opinion.

Ald. Craig moved that the waiving portion of the clause be struck out. This was lost by a vote of 7 to 4. Ald. Angrove, who arrived just as the vote was about to be put, did not vote.

The motion to adopt the clause as it stood in the report was lost on the same vote, as follows:—Ald. Free, Graham, Kent, McCann, Nickle, Toye, Hoag, 7.

Nays—Mayor Ross and Alds. Carson, Chown, Couper, Craig, Elliott, McCartney, 7.

Road Re-Building. The discussion on the city engineer's report regarding permanent and macadam pavement was left over, as the engineer was not in the city.

The mayor will call a special meeting to consider the matter. Regarding macadam road building the city engineer reported as follows:—

"I submit that the system of road improvement as carried out during the present year has been a decided success and that it is in the city's interest to continue this improvement for several years to come.

#### QUEEN'S PREPARING TO LICK 'VARSITY.

The Montreal Gazette Picks Queen's to Win the Championship—It Will Be a Great Game on Saturday.

This is not extra good weather for the football teams, yet the two Queen's fourteeners are working hard every day. The senior team is putting in a fine week's work, and 'Varsity will have to play twenty-five per cent. better than they have played yet this season to defeat the Presbyterians. All Queen's men are out at work, and it is good hard work they are doing, everyone of them. They will leave for Toronto on Friday at noon by special excursion train. The third team will also go up on Friday to play Varsity III. Manager Grimshaw hopes that his bunch will be able to overhaul Toronto's big lead.

Indoor Baseball. The league indoor baseball game scheduled for Tuesday evening at the armories, when the sergeants were chosen under the Municipal Act by the authority of council, the debentures required to be issued to be made payable not more than five years from date of issue.

About the Board of Health. Ald. Elliott said that he thought the citizens looked to the council to enquire into a matter that is engaging attention, viz., the contagious epidemic, in the city. He thought that it was the council's duty to give whatever advice and assistance possible to the Board of Health. Some suggestion could very properly come from the council.

For instance, he suggested that the Board of Health call in the assistance of the civic finance committee and also a half dozen local physicians to aid in stamping out the disease. The people wanted to know just how matters stood, and what the outcome would be. It had been reported to him that the quarantine of houses was carried out in a very lax manner. This should be looked into.

No discussion took place on the question raised, and the council adjourned at 9:40 o'clock.

In one of the stores they were rewarded for the trouble, as they had located one of the missing coats. Upon his return to Napanee, Chief Graham arrested a man who is alleged to have sold the coat in Kingston.

Dr. Bibbins stated that Kingston had as good quarters for isolation as could be desired; he had seen none better. Speaking about vaccination he stated that it had been found that children of parents who had been vaccinated, inherited partial immunity from smallpox. If they did catch the disease it was generally of a very light nature.
