



"I estimate the life of these improved streets at from five to ten years, and therefore recommend a period not longer than ten years for the debentures to

provide the necessary funds. "Regarding plant, the city should purchase a new steam roller of about twelve tons weight. Better streets would be obtained at less cost and more work could be done each year. I would not advise the abandonment of the old roller but would use both old and new. Such a new roller would cost from \$2,500 to \$3,000. The old steam roller would require general overhauling this winter and new boiler tubing. One road scraper is inadequate for street cleaning purposes and a second one should be purchased. This would greatly reduce the cost of street cleaning and could be purchased for about \$250.
