They attended church services regularly, and lived as good lives as the bulk of communicants. A man must not be judged by the fact that he does not sit for communion in a church. So the Laymen's Missionary Association must not deal only with church communicants in Kingston. I think it will be found that the adherent will be as liberal a contributor as the communicant. Mission contributions in Kingston have been perhaps below a fair average during the past eighteen years, as the people have been paying pretty heavily for new and renovated edifices. I would say that \$200,000 has been spent in that time in church building here. Now that the debts of nearly all the churches are pretty well cancelled, mission giving can very easily be increased.-CHURCH MEMBER
