Record of Kingston Church Giving to Missions.

Kingston, Nov. 12th.—(To the editor) In the issue of the Whig of Oct. 31st, I notice under the head of "Kingston Records," a statement of the average contribution to missions by the churches, according to membership.

According to the statement of membership, the Presbyterians seem to be the most pious lot in Kingston, fifty per cent. of their number, according to the census last winter, being communicants.

This must be a sweet morsel for my friend Rev. Dr. Mackie, the dean of the Presbyterian clergy in Kingston.

The Baptists and Congregationalists follow, with the Methodists fourth and the Anglicans last, only one quarter of the latter being communicants.

Is there not food for thought in this percentage showing?

However, I do not believe in shouldering the responsibility entirely on the members. I belong to a church where I know for a fact that years ago some of the very largest contributors to missions were not members or communicants, but just plain adherents.

They attended church services regularly, and lived as good lives as the bulk of communicants. A man must not be judged by the fact that he does not sit for communion in a church.
