"JACK" WILLIAMS CAPTAIN OF OTTAWA.

Comments on the Big Rugby Matches To-Morrow—Ottawa Won From Hamilton Tigers By Short Kick Tactics.

Eight deaths have resulted from American football already this season. The forward pass and other open play formations have not had the desired effect, apparently. Toronto World: With "Moon" Lee back in the game for "arsity, Saturday, the blue and white should score a win over Queen's, and thus tie the Presbyterians for the championship.

Queen's supporters will experience no difficulty in getting their bets up if they feel inclined to back their team as the local students will oblige them to their hearts' content, the Toronto Globe says.

Ottawa Journal: "Jack" Williams will act as captain in the game against Tigers on Saturday in Kingston, in place of Murray Kennedy, who will be unable to play. Williams has the signals down fine and has been playing great ball. The selection is a good one.

Although an effort is being made this season to reduce the salaries of hockey players, it is understood that "Art" Ross gets \$1,200 for playing this winter with Montreal. The money was deposited to his credit last week in the Montreal up-town branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in two checks of \$600 each.

When the Ottawa Football Club was notified by President Percy Molson, of the Interprovincial Union that he had decided in favor of Kingston for the final game between Hamilton and Ottawa on Saturday, the club held a hurry-up meeting, and decided unanimously to accept and play the game in the Limestone City.

P. R. Simpson, of the Royal Hotel, Hamilton, one of the heavy losers on the Tigers, said the Ottawa back line was the finest in Canada. He also picked Ryan and Stronach as superior outside wings to Lyon and Marriott.

Mr. Simpson, despite the defeat of Saturday, is prepared to bet \$500 to \$400 Tigers will beat Ottawa in the saw-off.

It appears that Longboat signed contracts—one with Claus, another Indian, and the other with Flanagan. Claus claims that ratification of his agreement is not necessary, and it is, therefore, valid, while the Indian's name to the Flanagan papers must have the agent's consent. Claus will, it is said, be on hand for the gates attracted by the new pro.

Hamilton Spectator: The Ottawa backs used a short kick, possessing as they do, two wonderful outside wings in Ryan and Stronach, gave the latter every opportunity to get under the ball or on top of the Hamilton backs. The Tigers, on the other hand, used a long, high punt, with the result that before the game was over the wing men were dead, owing to their efforts in endeavoring to follow up.

Toronto Mail—Empire: With "Moon" Lee at left inside wing in place of Muir, "arsity line will be stronger, while the backs are working better than ever. Lawson, whom the blue and white are counting on to demoralize the Presbyterians' defence, is in grand shape, barring a slightly sore shoulder, which a couple of "rest" will bring around. The condition of the team as a whole could not be better.

A Hamilton despatch says: The Hamilton Tigers and Ottawa will play off the game to break the tie for the championship of the Interprovincial Union at Kingston, Saturday afternoon. The Tigers are disappointed that Toronto was not chosen, but they like Kingston better than Montreal. A special train for the teams and supporters will probably be run, leaving Hamilton early Saturday morning. The team will be practically the same as played the Rough Riders in Ottawa, the only change being that Loftus will be out of the game and Loftus will probably be put in his place. Marriott will play although he has a broken nose, for the Tigers cannot draw on their intermediate team, as the intermediates will have their work cut out to defeat Dundas, with whom they are tied.

MUST GO HIGHER

Than Two Cents to Get Vessels For Storage.

Detroit, Nov. 13.—The Lake Superior grain took another another spurt on Wednesday and there was a much better demand for tonnage. Big cargoes were offered freely at 1 1/2c. on wheat to unload on arrival Buffalo, and a number of big cargoes were placed. The steamer Henry Steinbreck was chartered at Duluth and the steamer W. A. Rogers took a cargo at Fort William. Another big steel steamer was chartered to load the last week in November at 1 1/2c. Shippers at the head of the lakes have not been able to get any storage capacity this week, and the indications are that they will have to bid. The rate offer of 2c. was turned down by vesselmen. Owners say that the risk is too great and that many of the steamers that have been carrying ore all season are not in shape to hold grain.
