

Shippers at the head of the lakes have not been able to get any storage capacity this week, and the indications are that they will have to bid. The rate offer of 2c., was turned down by vessel-men. Owners say that the risk is too great and that many of the steamers that have been carrying ore all season are not in shape to hold grain.
