THE GREAT GRAFT

AN EX-MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT WRITES LETTER.

Where the Campaign Funds Come From—No Side Free From Bias—Why the Subsidies Pass So Easily Through the House.

Montreal Star.

We are printing, to-day, a letter signed "Ex-M.P." under the caption, "The Great Graft." We have taken pains to ascertain that it was actually written by the man whose name was attached for purposes of identification, and are thus in a position to say that it is the deliberate statement of an ex-member of parliament who sat in the last House of Commons. This gives it exceptional importance. It is the revelation of a man in a position to know what he is talking about. When he says that railway promoters who get cash bonuses and bond guarantees from parliament, contribute handsomely to the campaign funds of both parties, he speaks from a knowledge of the "inside."

This being so, the letter raises a vital issue. The people certainly do not want their money voted presumably to secure railway accommodation for the country, to be divided with the politicians who put the "deal" through parliament. This would be a diversion of their funds to purposes for which they were never intended, and would constitute a tremendous temptation to strongly partisan politicians to rush swollen votes of this character through the house for the sole purpose of getting a handsome "rake-off" for their campaign funds. Should such a conspiracy exist for the looting of the treasury, there would be no limit to its operations, for the opposition is accused of being concerned quite as deeply as the government would supply the money and the opposition would contribute silence, and the people would be doubly robbed for campaign funds which would neutralize each other politically, but which would furnish richly to the "boss" on both sides. Furthermore, they would be very likely to be robbed again for railway projects which could never stand sincere and vigilant public criticism.

This charge is often made, but it is not so often that it is preferred by a genuine member of parliament. In view of the source, the people cannot do other than listen and demand a reply. They will look especially to the coming session of parliament for this reply, when the public accounts committee can at least break the precedent said to be furnished when our correspondent charges that that ostentatiously vigilant body "never enquires into the disposal of these gifts of public cash or credit." Our correspondent promises further revelations. He cannot make them too soon or too fully.

The Great Graft.
To the Editor of the Montreal Star.
Sir,—The elections being over, both parties will cool down in time to normal temperature and we may expect the opposition to be using the ordinary weapons of an opposition—the public accounts committee in the House of Commons—for fresh bases for allegations, suspicions and innuendoes. I purposely omit the word "charge," for the reason that during the past night sessions, no charge, as such, has been made in parliament. Allegations instead of facts, statements instead of proof, suspicions and innuendoes instead of charges, have satiated but not convinced the public, and a few weeks hence we shall have this same method enforced, and the country's "statesmen" inflicting upon the people, through the press and otherwise, repetitions of the past years?

Elections may not be won by wishes or even prayers, and the majority of the people know it is a matter of considerable cost to a candidate (I may safely say all candidates) to carry through an election campaign. This takes money. Where does it come from? I will point out one and perhaps the most important source, namely, railway cash bonuses and bond guarantees.

The country pays the cash and gets the railway, and the general election fund of each political party gets some funds. The amounts are not usually small either. When the railway subsidies vote is up there is practically no discussion by either side of the house. Ten minutes in ten minutes is the rule. One party gets its share of putting it through, and the other for not opposing it. For twenty years and more it has been going on, and the system is growing more general and for greater amounts as the years roll on. The public accounts committee never enquires into the disposal of these gifts of public cash or credit. It might hurt the "party." I mean both parties in the House of Commons at Ottawa or in the provincial legislatures. Is it wrong for a beneficiary of the people's cash to divide with the benefactors? Is it right for governments and oppositionists to vote these moneys and take (before or after asking for it) their share of the fund? I may more fully discuss the bonus matter later on.—Yours truly, EX-M.P.
