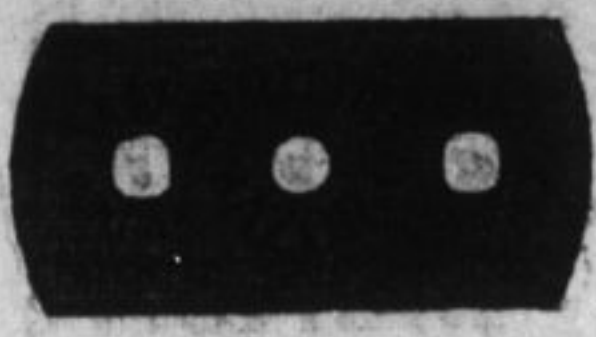
Western Physician Says it is a Senseless Fear and Does a Lot of Harm.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 14.—"Don't be afraid of draughts. One of the worst causes of tuberculosis is a senseless fear of draughts of air," said Dr. V. C. Vaughan, dean of the medical faculty of the University of Michigan in a lecture yesterday.

There is but one thing worse than tuberculosis, and that is the insane fear that many people have of the disease. You can sleep in the same bed with a consumptive without danger, if care and intelligence is shown.

Tuberculosis among the intelligent and moderately well-to-do is an accident. Among the poor and badly housed it is an epidemic. Tuberculosis is largely a disease of civilization. We are too well housed, too daintily fed.

Loss of weight, unusual lassitude of body, elevation of temperature, prolonged coughing should be looked after at once. Fresh air and wholesome food usually effect a cure, but don't get the disease thinking fresh air will cure you.
