ALMA MATER SOCIETY FIXES VARIOUS DATES.

For Coming Events—Queen's Debaters Against Ottawa College—Political Science Club Debate Next Friday.

After many years' of hard, straightforward criticism by the various critics of the Alma Mater Society, the period of reformation has been reached. The rear seats in Convocation Hall were practically deserted, on Saturday night, when the vice-president and secretary took their accustomed places and the front seats were honored by those who came through the driving storm.

The dates of three of the college functions were fixed at this meeting as follows:—Medical dinner on Thursday evening, December 17th; final year "At Home," Friday, Nov. 27th; science dinner, Wednesday, Dec. 23rd.

The society took a glance into the future and in preparation for the great political battle which will take place soon, appointed the following as an election committee:—Messrs. G. E. Kidd, B. A., T. B. Williams, A. D. MacDonnell, M.A.; J. L. Nicol, M.A. and J. Donohue.

It was deemed advisable and necessary to amend the constitution so as to include some new clubs and new regulations. The following will constitute a committee to have charge of such revision:—D. A. Carmichael, B.A.; D. R. MacArthur, M.A.; M. Y. Williams; R. J. MacDonnell, M.A. and C. J. Burns, B.A.

The various vacancies on committees, etc., were then filled. Four of these vacancies were on the Journal staff:—J. S. Duncan was appointed Alumni editor, C. E. Bernard, editor for medicine, J. M. McGillivray, associate editor, and Miss Helen Drummond, associate literary editor.

The dates for the inter-year debates were arranged as follows:—to versus to on Saturday evening, Nov. 28th; '11 versus '12, on Dec. 12th. Year '10 to hold a special meeting last evening to arrange a subject and to select a debate committee.

The Alma Mater welcomed back D. J. Fraser, a former member of its executive on Saturday night. Mr. Fraser made a brief address in which he expressed his pleasure at paying a visit to his Alma Mater and of seeing "the boys" again.

Students look forward with patience to the night when they shall be favored with a programme by members of the freshmen year. The secretary has written to the freshmen requesting them to supply a programme, but no reply has been received as yet.

The first debate in the Intercollegiate series this year will be at Queen's with Ottawa College, on Dec. 4th. A. D. Cornett, B.A. and M. R. Bow, B.A. will debate for Queen's.

The first debate of the political science debating club will take place on Friday evening, Nov. 20th. The subject is "Resolved that undenominational religious instruction should be enforced by law in the public schools of Ontario."

The affirmative will be taken by A. D. Pringle and J. Weaver; the negative by A. B. Klugh and C. S. McLaughlin.

Notwithstanding the disagreeable weather there was an immense audience present at the Grand Opera House last evening to witness John C. Green's moving pictures, vaudeville and mystery show. Every seat was occupied by a well-pleased audience.

Prof. Green is quite an expert in his magical work and gave some slight-of-hand tricks that were worthy of the black art presented by the celebrated magicians, Jerome Blitz and Jacobs in the days gone by.

The colored pictures were really works of art and were viewed with much interest. The principal ones were:—"The wonderful flames (colored)," a trip through Cairo, Egypt, showing a variety of scenes in that wonderful land; the great Derby race in 1908; a trip to dreamland; the orange peel and the trouble it caused.

Burton C. Peters, an old favorite, in connection with the illustrated views, sang with much spirit and acceptance, "Beneath the Old Grape Arbor Shade," and "Santego Flynn." He was repeatedly and vigorously applauded. The programme will be entirely changed on Wednesday and Friday evenings this week.

Detroit, Nov. 17.—Information comes that Nikola George, an Italian, who formerly lived in Chicago, had accumulated a fortune of \$20,000, largely by professional begging. United States immigration officials barred the man as an undesirable when he attempted to return to the United States side after a two-years' residence in Ottawa.

Nikola is now staying in Windsor, with his wife and seven children, in the hope of getting across the border later on. He admits he has property worth \$0,000 in Chicago. He styles himself a laborer. He was turned back at Niagara Falls and then came on to Windsor to meet the same experience.

Death From Poison. Watertown, N.Y., Nov. 17.—Miss Kate Eaton, twenty-two years of age, residing at Adams, died, yesterday, from the effects of laudanum taken Saturday evening.

According to Coroner Hollis the poison was taken with suicidal intent. For some time the girl has been the main support of her family, her father now being in Florida for his health. It is said that the outlook affected her mind.

Von Buelow To Stay. Berlin, Nov. 17.—Emperor William, to-day, in a conference with Chancellor Von Buelow, at the Potsdam palace, promised to make concessions to public opinion in the future, to exercise more reserve, to interfere less in governmental affairs and to be more careful of what he says both in private and public utterances. As a result of these assurances Von Buelow will remain in office.

Swept By A Storm. Port Elizabeth, Cape Colony, Nov. 17.—A terrible rainstorm has swept part of Cape Colony and caused a heavy overflow of Daakens river. A number of bridges were destroyed and a large amount of property swept to sea. Several lives were lost and the damage is almost more than a million dollars.

Accused Of A Crime. Toronto, Nov. 17.—Joseph Hallett, arrested here on the request of the Winnipeg police, on a charge of murder, it being alleged he ran down and killed a girl on the street, was arraigned in the police court, this morning, and remanded until Friday, which time it is expected that a warrant and a Winnipeg police officer will have arrived.

Fourteen-Year Sentence. Chicago, Nov. 17.—Peter P. Van Vlisningen, a prominent real estate dealer, pleaded guilty to misappropriating \$8,500 and was sentenced to serve fourteen years in prison. According to District-Attorney Barbour, the total amount involved in the alleged misappropriation of Van Vlisningen is about \$750,000.

Ended In Death. Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 17.—In an endeavor to break all previous world's records, for twenty-four hours' continuous automobile driving, Emilio Striker, was almost instantly killed, this morning, and his Renault car smashed.

Taken A Firm Grip. Pekin, Nov. 17.—Prince Chun, the regent of the empire, in fear of the increasing excitement and revolutionary movements, has taken a firm grip on affairs, and has adopted strenuous measures that will result in the maintenance of peace for a time at least.
