## WAS HE A BIGAMIST? THAT QUESTION STILL RE MAINS UNSETTLED.

Wife No. 2 The Winner—Will Giving Her Estate Declared Legal  
It Will Be Entered For Probate.

(Continued from page 4.)

Brockville, Nov. 18.—Justice Falconbridge, last night, delivered his judgment in the Warnock case, saying the legality of the first marriage did not affect the will in favor of Mrs. Eva Warnock, and witnesses for Mrs. Agnes Warnock had not proven that Warnock was not of full testamentary capacity when he drew the will. He gave judgment for the will to be entered for probate, but reserved his decision as to costs.

Brockville, Nov. 17.—Nominally the intensely interesting and dramatic case heard, to-day, before Chief Justice Falconbridge at the assizes here was to determine who was lawfully entitled to some \$34,000 left by James G. Warnock, a former well-known Ottawa merchant, who died in Brockville in January last. Really the fight was one between two women, each of whom was desirous of proving that she alone was the legitimate wife of Warnock, and as such entitled to his fortune.

Mrs. Warnock No. 1 claimed she was married to the deceased and lived with him as his wife for seventeen years, bearing four children, whose legitimacy was not open to question, and that the second Mrs. Warnock, whose baby was born after Mr. Warnock's death, was only a bigamist's victim. In his will Warnock left \$5,000 each to the daughters of Mrs. Warnock No. 1, and the balance of his estate to Mrs. Warnock No. 2. The claim was that Warnock, when the will was made, was near death and incapable of exercising judgment on so serious a question. This claim, the judge disallows, without touching on the question of the legality of the marriage.

From two points the testimony of Mrs. Warnock was grouped on the opening day: First, that she was the legal wife of Warnock, having been married to him at Ogdensburg on August 12th, 1891, by Rev. William Greaves, a Methodist minister, since deceased, in the presence of two witnesses, and, second, that the marriage to the other Mrs. Warnock took place in 1907, after Warnock, because of hard drinking, was not capable of distinguishing between right and wrong. In her direct examination Mrs. Warnock No. 1 had produced what she swore was her marriage certificate, and stated that after the marriage in Ogdensburg Warnock and she, as husband and wife, lived at Mrs. Warnock's brother's house until 1892. She never heard of a license. She could not say if it were a hotel or not in which she was married.

James F. Greaves, an elderly man, testified that he lived in Gregg, Lewis county, New York state, and that he was the son of the late Rev. Thomas Jefferson Greaves, a Methodist minister, who died in December, 1904, aged eighty-eight years. In answer to questions by Mr. Hellmuth he said he recognized the handwriting in an old diary and a hymn book produced as being that of his father. He also certified to an old ambrotype picture as being his father and mother. He inspected the marriage certificate of August 12th, 1891, but would not swear to the genuineness of his father's signature on it.

A. M. Payne testified that he was a clerk of twenty-three years' standing in the post office department, and an expert on handwriting. He thought that one had written the entire writing of the marriage certificate of August 1891. As to the discrepancies in handwriting in the diary of the Rev. T. J. Greaves, he thought that different members of the same family had written the different entries therefrom, because he observed certain family characteristics in them. He then pointed out a number of similarities in the writing in the diary and in the marriage certificate. August was spent "August," the figure 2 and the small "s" were also alike in both. He testified that after days of careful study he was convinced the marriage certificate and the diary was written by the same hand.

The witnesses this afternoon were Edward Cushing and Ward Devlin, employees of Warnock, who swore as to his drinking habits during the two years prior to his death; Mrs. Elizabeth McEwen, sister of Mrs. Agnes Warnock, and her daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Mitchell, whose evidence corroborated the fact that he was married in 1891; Rev. Father Sloan, parish priest of St. Bridget's church, who produced the baptismal register showing Warnock's own signature as the legitimate father of four girls.
