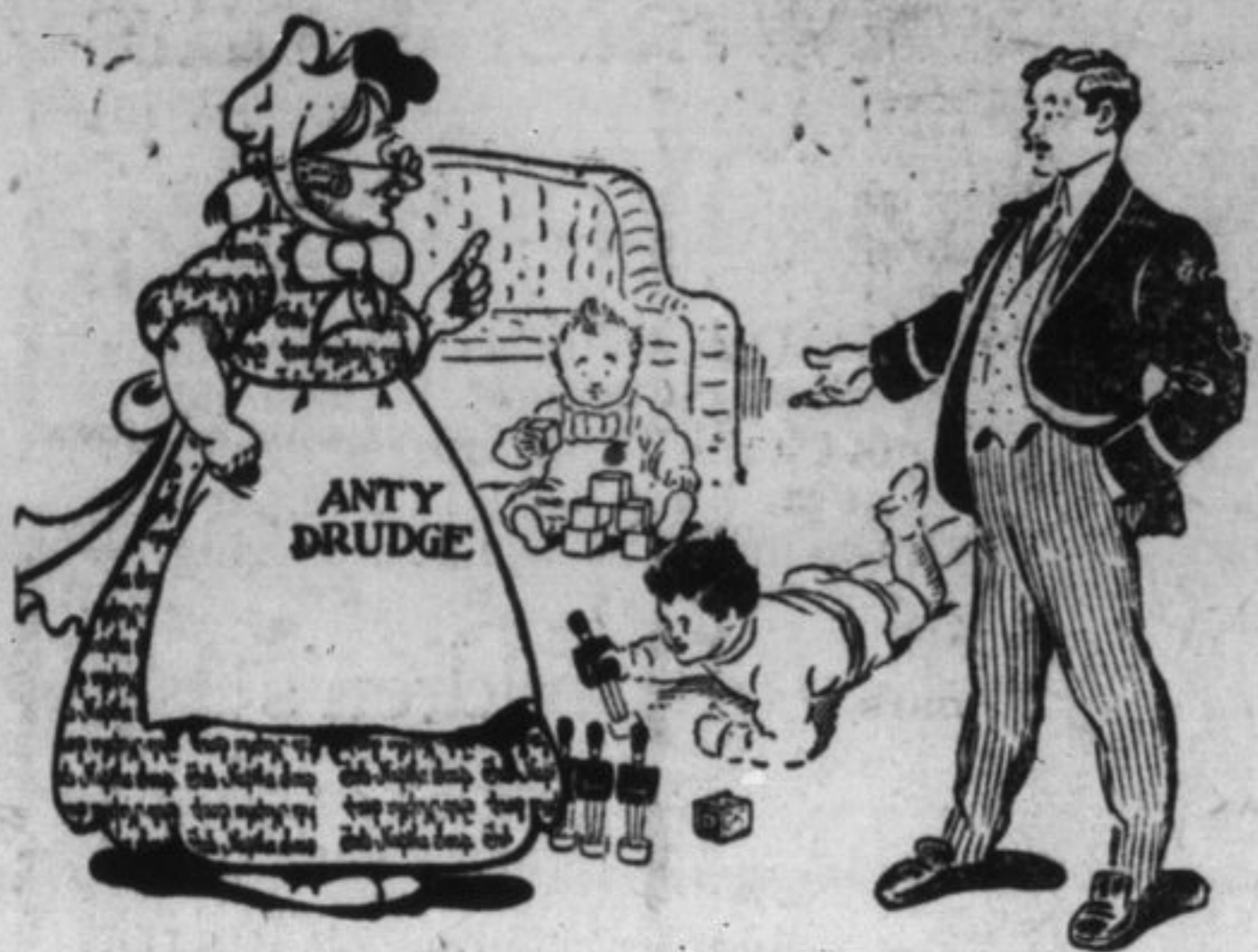

OTTAWA WILL LIKELY CHEER FOR QUEEN'S

In the Play-off With Varsity—Simpson, of Hamilton, is Playing Again—Coach Griffith Says Varsity Will Kick Queen's.

Although the Tigers have landed the championship this year they are facing a deficit in their treasury, says the Spectator. The three teams have been just as expensive as usual, while the hospital bill for the injured is said to reach a pretty high mark. To add to the combined gate on the three home games in the regular I.R.F.U. schedule has been just \$2,000 less than it was last year.

The Canadian rugby union has decided that Lee McCrimmon, the star kicking half of the T.A.A.C., O.R.F.U. champions, is ineligible to play against the Tigers on Saturday. This decision was arrived at following a protest lodged by Manager Thompson of the Hamilton rugby club, yesterday. McCrimmon has not participated in an O.R.F.U. game, as is required, and the Tigers availed themselves of the technicality to weaken their Canadian semi-final opponents.

The Peterboro Auditorium roller rink has booked Alfred Shrubbs to run at the rink on December 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The man who is out after Longboat's scalp would like to meet relays of local runners from one mile up. Shrubbs will also compete against roller skaters in hand-cup events.

Dr. Hendry will referee the Canadian championship semi-final at Hamilton Saturday and H. Griffith will umpire. "If that Ottawa team stays together next year it will land the championship of the dominion," says Percy Molson, president of the Big Four.

Coach Griffith is confident that Varsity will beat Queen's in the play-off at Ottawa.

Peterboro will be represented in the junior series of the O.H.A. by the chiefs, a junior team, who last winter played independent hockey. The youngsters will average only seventeen years of age, but they are fast, good stick handlers, and have developed an effective combination.

Sporting Notes.

Varsity hockey team has to tour of last year's champions—Herb Clark, Chas. Tom, Davidson and Rankin. Proxies are no good at the O.H.A. convention next Saturday. Each club must be represented by a member thereof.

The R.C.Y.C., Toronto, will not send a boat to Rochester for the Canada's cup if Seneca is the Yankee defender.

Now that Montreal has dropped out of the E.C.H.A., Glass and Johnston will likely wear the Wanderer colors again.

Lindsay, winner of the junior O.R.F.U. district No. 2, and Brockville, winners of district No. 3, will play at Peterboro Saturday.

Hamilton Times: Perhaps the reason the Bradford bout is being referred to as a "roasted-up fight" is that it was "roasted" by the Spectator.

Hamilton Spectator: The Toronto press still refuse to give the Tigers their due. Perhaps when the Cubs walloped the T.A.A.C. and then Varsity or Queen's they will get some fair criticism.

Ottawa Journal: The penitentiary belt line runs a great service right through to the touch line at the Kingston field. The motorman and conductor are at the end of the line, and start and stop the car per signal, viz., "Pull up at the next corner, Bill."

Montreal Witness: At the E.C.H.A. meeting an important change was made to the regulation regarding the dropping of a player on the opposing team when a man is injured, so not to delay play. It was decided to make goalkeepers an exception to this rule, allowing them time to recover before continuing the game.

Hamilton Herald: Some one in Kingston sent out a story to the effect that Ben Simpson was so badly injured that he would not be able to play again this season. Ben was rather badly battered up on Saturday and had to rest up yesterday, but he will be out to practice this afternoon and will be in the game on Saturday as large as life. The same here on Saturday will be between the T.A.A.C. and the Tigers for the Canadian championship and promises to be more sensational than was expected. The Toronto team has been strengthened.

Ottawa Free Press: With the playing of the Varsity-Queen's saw-off here next Saturday the question arises which team will get Ottawa support? There are no Ottawa players on either team. Kingston is somewhat nearer home than Toronto and Queen's may find more sympathy from the crowd than will be offered Varsity. In intercollegiate circles both fourteeners are considered the finest representatives of college football in many years. Varsity supporters claim this year's team is quite up to the standard of the champions of 1905, who defeated Rough Riders in Toronto. It is doubtful if Queen's ever had a stronger team.

Pittsburg hockey writers are now busily engaged explaining hockey rules and defending some rulings made by Roy D. Schooley, the Toronto man, who is in charge of the big garden this year. On Saturday night Schooley called the puck back because Garret Simsmith was loafing off-side. There was a great howl because the player had not touched the puck and the Pittsburg crowd is not yet educated to the fact that a player can be off-side when ahead of the puck, that is, when the puck is between himself and the goal he is defending. YOUTH IN LOVE.

Liquor and Gambling Also Responsible For Accidents.

New York, Nov. 19.—Love, liquor, gambling and improvements in automatic safety devices and signals were some of the things responsible for many fatal railroad accidents by speakers at the eighteenth annual meeting of the New York & New England Association of Railway Surgeons.

Dr. R. W. Corwin, Pueblo, Co., told of a young engineer, who, through jealousy, neglected his work with the result that his train was wrecked. He said to the fact that the night before he had gambled away his pay cheque, backed his train into an excursion train. The speaker denied that railroads overwork their men by liberate choice, and that it would be decidedly false economy for them to do so.

"Some think drink is mistaken for brain fog and overwork," said he. "The public has a right to demand from railway systems that employees be given sufficient rest, but that does not go far enough. The employees should take rest during the time allotted to them, but when they do not, what then? The employee who uses his recreation for gambling, drinking and smoking to excess is no more fit for work than is the man who has been on duty eighteen or twenty hours."
