### QUEEN'S NEED COACH

#### THE LACK OF ONE LOST THEM CHAMPIONSHIP.

Gymnasium Classes at the Armouries—The 14th Regiment Hockey Team—It Will Be As Strong As Last Season's Champions.

Queen's Rugby Club has two good trainers, but it must get a professional coach, who will devote his whole time to teaching the team various systems. This season, as compared with the last, practically no tricks in their work on the ground. Coach Hamilton, of McGill, said that Queen's had the best team in the intercollegiate league, but lacked coaching. If he had had the Presbyterians under his control, there is no doubt but what they would have put Varsity down and out in Toronto on November 14th. In the last three matches, Queen's showed a lamentable lack of tactics on the field. Two backs and then a kick won't do against the trick work of Varsity and Ottawa. The latter came nearly defeating Queen's in Kingston on November 7th by a few simple but tricky tactics. And so, the athletic committee of Queen's had better get to work at once and look after for a coach. There is no reason why "Pud" Hamilton, who has trained McGill for the past three seasons should not be secured. He is a Kingston young man, and the old star of the champion Granite rugby team of '99.

Classes At Armouries. The gymnasium classes at the armouries are now in full swing and are largely attended. The classes are held every Tuesday and Thursday evenings, under Physical Instructor, Palmer, formerly director at Queen's. Mr. Palmer certainly understands his work and is quite at home with a large class under his supervision. The men seem to enjoy the classes, taking to the work in the right spirit. It will certainly do them a world of good to have such a place to work out during the winter. The gymnasium in the new gun shed is fitted up fine, everything that is needed being at hand. The gun shed made a capital piece for the gym, as it was very long and of about regulation width, every season the classes increase and the men benefit from the work, the gymnasium will likely be improved.

Local Hockey Prospects. Next Saturday will see the end of football. Then the fans will commence to "dope" on hockey. It will not be long until the teams organize, and begin to sort out their players. At a glance what have the soldiers this year to defend the O.H.A. championship? They have a good team as the team that won the championship last season. ### THE SPORT REVIEW

#### "MARTY" WALSH TO RECEIVE THE SUM OF \$1,200

For Playing Hockey with Ottawa—The Ottawa Free Press Says That Varsity Was Wrongfully Given a Touchdown.

The Varsity management feared that the oval will not accommodate the crowd for the Canadian championship final on Saturday, Hamilton will send 1,000 rooters in two special trains.

De. W. B. Hendry, of Toronto, president of the Canadian Union, has been appointed referee, and Phil McKenzie of Montreal or Russell Britton, of Gannaque, will umpire the Varsity-Tiger match on Saturday.

Varsity II and Tigers have been ordered by the C.R.F.U. to play in Hamilton Saturday in the semi-final game for the Dominion intermediate championship, the winners to meet the Grand Trunks, of the Quebec Union in the final.

Varsity have scored this season 124 points to 54 against them, while Queen's have made 100 against 61. They played seven games. Hamilton in championship games have scored 175 points to 59 against them this season. They played eight games.

Toronto Star: Comparing the two teams is not easy under the circumstances. Queen's had the stiffer line, but Varsity merited the better tacklers. Both quarters were good. On the back division Queen's were slier on the catch and Williams out-punted Gall.

John J. Hayes and Pietro Dorando run the Marathon distance in Madison Square, New York, on Wednesday, and Longboat will challenge the winner. On Saturday Longboat received a guarantee to race J. D. Marsh in Winnipeg on December 4th. He will accept for another date.

Shrubh has backed out of a match with Longboat, who wants a twenty-mile race first or no meeting. Shrubh has been after Longboat for months, and boasted on many occasions that he could beat the Indian over any distance of ground. He has now wiggled out.

Ottawa Free Press: The officials made two frightful errors in the five-yard tackling rule that virtually gave Varsity her try, and off-side interference, permitted Gall to run a kick away back of his own line, out to Varsity's twenty-yard line, the officials letting it go, and a certain Queen's score being frustrated.

Yale's share of the Harvard game receipts was \$33,000. From Princeton the amount is approximately \$20,000; from the other games—came about \$8,000. About \$10,000 was spent on repairs at Yale field, and \$5,000 went for the maintenance of the training table. About \$10,000 will be given to the crew for next spring and \$6,000 to the track management. The balance will be given to the general fund.

When the Harvard undergraduates and rooters left on Saturday, they took away with them at least \$80,000 which had previously belonged to Yale undergraduates. So confident of victory were the Yale students that they sold their furniture, and those who had shares in different corporations put them up with banks to raise money with which to bet. All this money went with the Crimson rooters on Saturday and to-day Yale is bankrupt.

Varsity will hold light practices each afternoon this week, but no hard work will be done. Coach Griffiths not caring to take chances on having any of his champions incapacitated for the big game Saturday, McDonald's knee is rounding to shape, and he will be ready to go against the Tigers. Muir, who has been a most valuable utility man, will be taken out, and "Moon" Lee, who has been filling McDonald's place, will go back to his original position on the wing.

Marty Walsh Gets \$1,200. Ottawa Free Press: "Marty" Walsh will be one of the best paid players in the E.C.H.L. this winter. Last Saturday, "Marty" accompanied the Queen's team here and after the game closed with the Ottawa Hockey Club to play this winter, his contract it is said, calling for \$800 a week. He has signed for twelve weeks, representing a salary of \$1,200. Walsh played centre last winter and wants to drop back a place this season and play man and rover in view, the change may be effected.

Marty has acquired quite a rugby reputation as well as fame on the ice, and three years ago proved himself one of the best quarters ever developed at Queen's. Just as he plays away at hockey in and around point, he used to butt his head through the line for useful gains. On the Queen's team that year were Jack and Ken Williams and Richardson, another boy who could play some hockey.
