

TO BE A SHAKE UP OF THE ONTARIO RUGBY FOOTBALL UNION.

There Will Be a Change in the Officers—May Place An Age Limit on Junior Teams.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—There will be a shake-up in the Ontario Rugby Football Union, at the annual meeting on December 12th. W. J. Snee is retiring from the presidency, and Dr. A. W. McPherson, Peterboro, is slated to succeed him. Dr. Wood, of the Toronto A.A.C., will likely be the next vice-president.

THE DOMINION GRANGE.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—The Dominion Grange opened its thirty-fourth annual session here, this morning, the gathering being one of the largest in the organization's history. Master O. G. Lethbridge, in his annual report, called for the extension of the rural mail delivery to cover all the main roads of cross roads with the privilege of having boxes at the junction of every cross road.

The Grange legislative committee, this afternoon, presented a report, which, among other things, thanked the government for resisting 'the unjust and unbecoming' demands of manufacturers for increases in the tariff and recommended the strengthening of the British preference by further lessening the duties on British goods.

May Deport Hindus Now in British Columbia. Ottawa, Nov. 26.—As there does not seem to be any likelihood of the Hindus of British Columbia accepting the proposal to be transferred to British Honduras, it is said that the interior department may take the extreme step of deporting them to India.

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—L. E. Gyr, ex-M.P. for Plover, has been appointed in Dominion government immigration agent in France. The department plans a systematic campaign in both France and Belgium, and will employ moving pictures for the purpose of advertising Canada.
