**MAJOR DE LOTBINIERE**  
CARRIED OUT A GREAT SCHEME IN INDIA.

Was Chief Engineer in Constructing Jhelum Power Works—Congratulated by the Maharajah—An R. M. C. Graduate.

The Times, of Bombay, India, of date September 28th, contains an interesting account of the inauguration of the great Jhelum Power works at Baramulla (Kashmir). These works were constructed on the Jhelum, under the supervision of Major Lotbiniere, R.E., a graduate of the Royal Military College, Kingston, Canada, in 1883.

The guests to the number of ninety were entertained at lunch by the Maharajah, and then proceeded to the electrical operating station, where the Maharajah, in a fine speech said that Kashmir might expect a brilliant and prosperous future, with such an electrical works. Regarding Major de Lotbiniere, the Maharajah said: "Major de Lotbiniere, the chief engineer, whose child this scheme is, deserves the highest gratitude of the Durbar for seeing a scheme like this brought into actual existence and working order. He has wielded the heavy responsibility of the department in a very creditable manner and has shown what ability and extraordinary power of scientific application he possesses."

Sir Francis Younghusband made this reference to the Canadian engineer:

"It is fitting also to acknowledge the keen intelligence and business-like interest which Sir Amar Singh has taken in the whole scheme and the very efficient and constant support which the foreign minister, Diwan Amar Nath, has afforded. Mr. Field, the state engineer, has done what all state engineers would not have had the sense to do. He has left the originator or organizer of the scheme to work it out in his own way and has loyally and generously supported him wherever his support would be a help. And to this organizer and organizer—to Major de Lotbiniere—must be given the chief credit to-day. It is due to his energy, his organizing capacity, and knack of selecting good men to work under him, his powers of persuasion, his driving power, his energy, confidence and his resources that this work is completed and completed up-to-date almost exactly to the date he named to me when I arrived here two and one-half years ago. I hope Canada will be as proud of him as he is of Canada."

But Major de Lotbiniere would be the first to acknowledge and has indeed time and again acknowledged to me that he could never have got the work through up-to-date if he had not had first-rate men to work under him. Captain Hunter had already served under him in Mysore, and here, as there, he could be relied on for a thoroughly thorough and reliable work on that most important part of the whole undertaking the flume line in which if there was a single flaw the whole flow of electric power and all that was dependent on it would come to a standstill.

The electrical establishment consists of the following officers: Major A. J. de Lotbiniere, C.E., R.E., the chief engineer, who initiated and carried out the whole work; Captain Hunter, in charge of the engineering (civil department), assisted by two officers, A. C. Dett, electrical engineer, and a large staff of assistants; L. A. Desy, superintendent of the dredging fleet, assisted by a staff of Canadians.

**FOR MURDER OF HUSBAND.**

Placed Under Arrest at Conclusion of Inquest.

Rochester, N.Y., Nov. 26.—Mrs. Georgia Sampson, widow of the late Harry Sampson, of Palmyra, who died on November 1st, as the result of a gunshot wound, was arrested for the murder of her husband. Sampson was a nephew of the late Admiral William Sampson.

It came out at the inquest that Sampson had discovered a letter written to his wife by a man outside of the family, which had been the cause of a bitter quarrel. It was testified that Sampson had a package of cheese in his hand when he fell dead in the farm house, which was held to preclude the idea that he was contemplating suicide at the time, or could have fired the shot from the rifle that killed him.

**TIMBER VS. INDUSTRIALS.**

Some Plain Facts For Intending Investors.

Unlike mushrooms, it takes half a century to re-forest the country. All the available timber is already located; the unlocated timber farther north is rendered valueless by the rivers all running to the north. Before railways can be built, the famine will be here and the enormous cost of transportation will make the price of most products when the railroads are built. It is admitted, beyond dispute that fire does not destroy fully matured timber if it is accessible to be cut within a reasonable period after the fire.

The only thing necessary is to make sure that the timber is in easy reach of good transportation facilities, that it is of a marketable quality, bought at a right price, in sufficient quantity to make it worth while handling.

**AN ASSOCIATION SUED**  
AND JUDGMENT GIVEN AGAINST IT.

Prices Fixed By a Hamilton Board—Reduction Ordered on a Contract—Association Sued For the Cut Off.

Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 26.—In a division court action, here, it was shown that the Hamilton brick manufacturers, some time ago, fixed the prices of their various grades of bricks and did business through a central office known as the Hamilton Builders Supply company, Crawford brothers, a member of that association, was ordered to supply a certain quantity of bricks to some people in Dundas. The Dundas people objected to the price and the association, thereupon, ordered that Crawford brothers make a reduction of thirty-seven cents per thousand. This the firm did and it then turned around and sued the association for \$11.84, the total of the reduction ordered by the association. Judge Monk gave judgment for Crawford brothers. It is rumored this was a test case and that other members of the association, anxious to kick over the traces, will now bring suit.



**FROM CABINET TO SENATE.**

Rumor has been busy with the name of Mr. S. Secretary of State Elihu Root of late. He is now prominently mentioned as a probable successor to Thomas C. Platt as one of the Empire State's pair of United States senators. Mr. Root is here shown at his appearance after a hard day's work, with an inmate of Muldoon's sanatorium, whom he has made several visits recently, in order to put himself in physical shape to stand up beneath the burden of affairs of state, which he has not yet discharged while a member of the Roosevelt cabinet.

Thief Went Through His Clothes While He Was Asleep. R. S. Ferguson, a Hamilton traveller, is of the opinion that the "only good place to keep money is in the bank. He is in Kingston, on business, and says that while stopping at an hotel in Toronto this week, he was relieved of \$10, while he was in bed asleep. Before retiring for the night he forgot to lock his door, and during the night some sneak thief made his way into his room and went through the pockets of his trousers, where he kept his money. There were two \$5 bills, and in his coat close by there was a purse which contained \$15. He made off with the two \$5 bills, but did not take the purse which contained the larger sum. It is believed that he became frightened and did not wait to see what was in the pocket-book. The thief took the pocket-book out of the coat and left it in one of the pockets in the trousers. Mr. Ferguson reported the case to the hotel authorities but was unable to get trace of the money. He says he heard no one in his room during the night.
