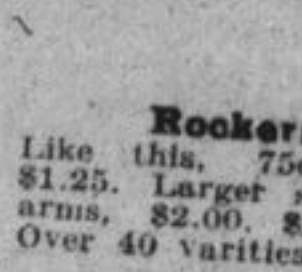

DOCTORS SATISFIED WITH WHAT HEALTH BOARD HAS DONE.

In Regard to Stamping Out Contagion—The Doctors Had No Further Suggestions to Offer—Concern in the Efforts.

On Friday afternoon a conference of the Board of Health, the civic finance committee and Kingston physicians was held in the city buildings with regard to the disease which is now decreasing. Previous to the conference the doctors held a meeting and passed this resolution:

"That insofar as the present efforts of the Board of Health are apparently productive of good, we, as practising physicians, have no further suggestions to make."

At the conference which followed Medical Health Officer Bell gave an account of the procedure he had adopted. Hon. Dr. Sullivan said he had been ill and had not seen any of the cases but he doubted very much if Kingston had any small-pox at all. In fact he refused to believe it, notwithstanding the fact that the profession generally declared it to be that disease.

The following resolution was moved by Dr. Garrett, seconded by Dr. Kilborn, and adopted by the three representative bodies, Dr. Sullivan alone dissenting:

"That this conference concurs most heartily with the opinion expressed by experts as to the existence of small-pox in this municipality; that we further agree with the efforts of the city council with reference to stamping out the disease."

The cases are on the decided decrease, only one having developed in the past week. The precautions taken seem to have taken the contagion by the throat. Very soon it will be stamped out.

TIGERS OR VARSITY?

Quite a Number Went From Here to See the Game.

'Varsity or Hamilton? These two rugby teams came together on Rosedale oval, this afternoon, and should have put up a great battle for dominion of the title. It is not the first time that an intercollegiate team has tried for, and won this coveted title. The two teams have each won the same number of games and there is very little difference in the number of points scored for and against them in the season.

The Tigers are picked as winners in all parts of the province. They are heavier, older players. 'Varsity are light and are depending on their speed to win out, but if Tigers play the style of ball they are used to, 'Varsity's speed will not be much in evidence. On the other hand, if 'Varsity's line can prove strong enough to hold Hamilton, giving Gaul and Lawry good protection, the game may be close.

Mr. Publow has intimated that the leniency he showed the past two years will be replaced with a more rigid enforcement of the act, and he trusts factorymen and patrons will take the hint.

Prof. Mavor Speaks on "Russia" on Friday Evening.

There was a good audience in Convocation Hall last night, to hear an address on "Russia," given by Prof. Mavor of Toronto University. At the close of his address, Prof. Mavor showed a number of views on the canvas, which were taken in Russia, and gave a full explanation of them.

Prof. Mavor traced the history of Russia and gave a most interesting account of events that have occurred there. A fine lot of views were given of the event, and added greatly to the pleasure of the evening.

At the close, a hearty vote of thanks, moved by M. J. Patten, president of Queen's Political Science and Debating Club, was extended to Prof. Mavor.
