



### A NARROW ESCAPE

#### MISS ASQUITH HAD A SERIOUS MISHAP.

The Premier's Daughter Came Very Close to Death—Overcome By Fatigue She Was Found Unconscious.

Miss Violet Asquith, the daughter of the Prime Minister, has had a startling adventure in the neighborhood of Slains Castle, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, where she was staying with her parents during the Parliamentary recess.

Miss Asquith went out in the afternoon to walk along the beach to the north of the castle. She returned in time for dinner, but she had forgotten the book which she took with her, so about 8 o'clock in the evening she set out in quest of it, remarking to her maid that she would be back in a few minutes. When nearly two hours had passed without her reappearance, a message was despatched to the coastguard and the local policeman that she was missing.

A search party of coastguards was organized, and, provided with ropes, ladders and lanterns, made a diligent search among the rocks until eleven o'clock without success. Anxiety was intense, but the search seemed hopeless until the dawn had actually been made when Samuel Milne, a young fisherman, who had been fishing in the bay in the afternoon, told some of the members of the search party that he had seen on the cliffs a young woman sitting on the north side of the Longhaven and a considerable distance from where the search was being made.

The search party hastened to the place described by Milne, and as they neared it they heard barking, and soon Miss Asquith's dog came running toward them. As soon as it saw them it turned and ran back and then turned again.

At length the search party found Miss Asquith lying unconscious at the edge of a very steep cliff.

Miss Asquith was quickly carried home, and Dr. Stewart, from Hatton, was summoned at once and attended to her.

It is thought that possibly Miss Asquith had found that she had left her book further away than she thought, but with characteristic tenacity had resolved that she would not turn back until she had discovered it, and had pushed on until overcome by fatigue.

### DYING PEERAGES.

Many of the New Families Will Disappear in a Few Years.

There are nearly a dozen ladies in Great Britain who are possessors in their own right, most of them without male heirs, while two more ladies will be added to the number when Lord Wolseley and Lord Roberts die. The former has no son, but his viscounty was conferred with special remainder to his daughter, and with remainder again to her male issue, so that in that way the title may be perpetuated, while in the case of Lord Roberts, who lost his only son in the South African war, the earldom has also been conferred with special remainder to his daughter.

Amongst the peers whose titles will, under present circumstances, cease with their death might be mentioned Lord Milner, who has no heir, and Lord Llandaff, who, as Mr. Henry Matthews, filed the office of Home Secretary from 1886 to 1892.

Lord James of Hereford, an Attorney-General of the seventies, has no relative who can succeed to his title, unless he had Lord Shand, a Scotch judge of great eminence, who died four years ago. Another famous light of the legal world whose title lapsed with his death was Lord Brampton, who, as Sir Henry Hawkins, established the reputation of being the finest criminal lawyer of his day.

Lord Northcliffe, formerly Sir Alfred Harmsworth, has no heir to succeed him. Lord Kitchener remains a bachelor, and his brother is therefore heir to the title, while Lord Welby, who was Permanent Secretary of the Treasury from 1885 to 1894, had no heir to the title, conferred for conspicuous service to the state.

Chained-Up Books.—The customs of old times are brought to mind when one visits Broadland Parish Church, near Derby, England. In this church is a set of chained books, which are kept in an old oak desk at the eastern end of the north aisle. The desk is a double one, with hinged lids, which can be locked. One recess contains Burnett's "History of the Reformation," published in 1679 and 1681, and the "Works of Josephus," printed in 1702. On the other side of the desk are "Works of John Jewell, Bishop of Salisbury," 1606; "Discourses of some London Divines, 1604; "History of the Early Martyrs," 1637, by Wm. Cave, D.D.; "History of the Fathers to the Fourth Century," 1683, by Dr. Cave; and "History of the Apostles," 1684, by Dr. Cave. Each book is attached to the desk by a light chain, two feet long, so as to prevent any unauthorized person from removing it.

### Will Sell The Craft.

Quebec, Nov. 28.—It is likely that the wreck of the government steamer King Edward as it now lies on the rocks at English Bay, Anticosti, will be sold by auction. ### War Artist as Stowaway.

Mr. Melton Prior, the well-known war artist and correspondent, who was married recently to Miss Georgina Douglas, daughter of the late Mr. George M'Intosh Douglas of the British Civil Service, has taken part in over twenty-four campaigns and revolutions, his first appearance on the battlefield being in the Ashanti war of 1873, his last during the Russo-Japanese war of 1904. Mr. Melton Prior developed pluck and daring early in life. When he was four years old his elder brother induced him to accompany him on an apple-stealing expedition into a neighbor's garden, and when their pinners were crammed full, they were suddenly disturbed, and beat a hasty retreat. When his parents lived in Boulogne he hid himself on one of the London steamships in hopes of being taken on as a sailor, but it happened to be a rough night, and his first feelings of sea-sickness daunted him. When he was discovered and brought before the captain he was made to do some very nasty work, and was thoroughly sickened of sailing. As an old campaigner, Mr. Prior has always believed in making himself comfortable, and boasts that he was the only man with a tent in Ulundi, where Lord Chelmsford slept under a tarpaulin.

### Referring the Head Hunters.

A curious development is in steady progress in the Solomon Islands, the group in the South Pacific which lies to the west of New Guinea, whose people have earned such unenviable notoriety as head hunters. The young men of the tribes in these fertile and beautiful islands are abandoning the historic pursuit which has made them dreaded for centuries in the South Seas, and are taking to the copra industry. Copra, which is the dried inferior of the coconut, is valued commercially for the oil which can be pressed from it, and some of the young Solomon Islanders are accumulating considerable wealth by extracting it, though the older generation, to whom head-hunting is still the only profession for a gentleman, are said to look down upon them as being "in trade."
