She returned in time for dinner, but she had forgotten the book which she took with her, so about 8 o'clock in the evening she set out in quest of remarking to her maid that she When nearly two hours had passed without her reappearance, a message was despatched to the coastguard and the local policeman that she was muss-

A search party of coastguards was organized, and, provided with ropoladders and lanterns, made a diligent search among the rocks until eleven o'clock without success.

Anxiety was intense, but the search seemed so hopeless that the sugges-tion of weiting until the dawn had actually been made when Samuel Milne, a young fisherman, who had been fishing in the bay in the afternoon, told some of the members of the house party that he had seen from his boat a young woman sitting on on the north side of the Longhaven and a considerable distance from where the search was being made. The search party hastened to the place described by Milne, and, as they neared it, they heard barking, and soon Miss Asquith's dog came running toward them. As soon as it saw them it turned and ran back and

At length the search party found Miss Asquith lying unconscious at the odge of a very steep cliff.

War Artist as Stowaway.

Mr. Melton Prior, the well-known war artist and correspondent, who was married recently to Miss Georgina Douglas; daughter of the late Mr. George M'Intosh Douglas of the British Civil Service, has taken part in over twenty-four campaigns and revolutions, his first appearance on the battlefield being in the Ashanti war of 1873, his last during the Russo Japanese war of 1904. Mr. Melton Prior developed pluck and daring early in life. When he was four years old his elder brother induced him to accompany him on an apple-stealing expedition into a neighbor's garden, and, when their pinafores were crammed full, they were suddenly disturbed, and beat a hasty retreat. Melton's brother fell headlong into a rain-water butt, and Melton himself, in getting over the palings into his parents lived in Boulogne he hid himself on one of the London steamships in hopes of being taken on as a sailor, but it happened to be a rough night, and his first feelings of sea-sickness daunted his ardor.
