THE NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Hon. Hugh John Macdonald is a privy councillor, having taken the oath on Saturday at Ottawa.

At Berlin, Ont., St. Jerome's Roman Catholic College sustained a \$32,000 loss by fire on Sunday.

It is stated that Francis Ferdinand, heir to the throne of Austria, will assume the real power in the empire this week.

A fine paragon, the gift of the Massey estate, was handed over to the trustees of Hope Methodist church, East Toronto.

Harold Hough, a parolee prisoner from St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, was sent to Kingston penitentiary, from Toronto, today, for three years.

Thomas Williams, from England, who has served one short term for theft already, was sentenced, today, in Toronto to four years in the penitentiary for house-breaking.

At Montreal already \$23,850 of the \$50,000 stipulated by Col. Jeffrey Burdland as a condition to his gift of \$50,000 for the establishment of a tuberculosis dispensary had been collected.

American consuls in Germany are having slight success in obtaining replies from German manufacturers respecting the cost of production of their wares, how wages are distributed, etc., as all, or nearly all, of the manufacturers have quietly combined to resist the inquiries.

At Deloraine, Man., Arthur Robinson was burned to death on Friday night. In company with his brother and some neighbors he went hunting in the Tuttle mountains. Apparently the bedding caught fire, and he was suffocated while the others were away. Deceased was married and leaves six children.

DEATH IN PITTSBURG.
The Late William Scott, a Native of Ireland.

William Scott died at his home on the Woodburn road on November 18th. He was born in Ireland about eighty-two years ago and when quite young came to Pittsburg, settling there. Fifty years ago he married Eliza Sinclair, of Kingston, and together they won a comfortable home for themselves and children. Last eighteenth of March they celebrated their golden wedding. Deceased was very obliging and kind to his neighbors; upright and honest in his dealings, and as a husband and father he was faithful and affectionate, so that his life will be missed by all. He had been in declining health for a long time, but bore his sickness with wonderful patience.

Rev. Mr. McQuarrie, Presbyterian minister, preached a very impressive funeral sermon. Afterwards his remains were placed in Caramat vault. Besides his widow he leaves nine children, namely: Mrs. William Sutherland and John Scott, Kingston; Mrs. Nechan Trotter, Brandon; Mrs. Henry Johnston and Mrs. Thomas Gillespie, Pittsburg; Mrs. John Palmer, Maberly; and Frederick, Olive and Harvey at home.

Was Formerly a Resident.
The remains of the late Rev. Joseph Ellwell, who died in Toronto in his 96th year, were interred at Ottawa in the sixties he was well known to the people of Kingston, having resided here in charge of the congregation of the Catholic Apostolic church, having previously resigned a parish in New Brunswick in the Anglican church. The most interesting circumstance of his life was that he had the privilege of working for a time in London under the great Edward Irving, who, to quote the essayist Gillilan: "Sprang in haste upon the dead arena of his age and roused it by his thunder tramp to life." Mr. Ellwell was of a kindly, genial disposition, possessed of an active mind, and stored in classic and English literature. He retained his bright mental faculties to the last, and charmed his circle of friends with youthful spirit and apt quotation from the great writers. He was of the old school that has passed away.

An Anxious Hubby.

On returning home to break the news to the rest of the family, he found his wife there to meet him. The Grand Trunk authorities should be more particular, as this has occurred before.

Effect of An Explosion.
Toronto, Nov. 30.—An explosion, caused by spontaneous combustion, occurred in the premises of the Harvey quilt and bedding factory, Pearl street, this morning. The roof was blown off of the building and the west side of the wall was blown out.
