## A CLEVER PRODUCTION

### OF SHAKESPEARE'S "MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING"

By Queen's University Dramatic Club Before a Large Audience—The Players All Covered Themselves With Glory.

Queen's University Dramatic Club, presented Shakespeare's comedy "Much Ado About Nothing" to a crowded house at the Grand on Monday evening. Nearly every seat was filled, the balcony being occupied mostly by students.

The play chosen proved one of the best that the club has yet presented, and it was certainly the best portrayal of the great author's work seen here in a long time. The presentation certainly surprised a large number present. Not once during the performance was there the slightest hesitation by any of the amateurs, over their lines. The club must have spent a great deal of time on the play and deserve great credit for its success.

Miss Ada F. Chown, as "Beatrice," won premier honors. This is not the first time that local theatregoers have had the pleasure of seeing one of their own city upon the stage. In "Beatrice," Miss Chown had a part that suited her admirably, and she handled it in fine style. She possesses a clear voice, that carries to all parts of the house, without the apparent effort, often noticed in amateurs, thus showing careful training. Miss Chown appeared perfectly at home before the footlights, doing her work in a way that proved her an actress of ability.

A. E. O'Neil, as "Benedick," a young lord of Padua, won all the glory in the male roles. His work was all that could be desired, and he was well suited to his part. "Benedick" and "Beatrice" handled the main comedy roles in a manner that was a delight to all.

C. S. Russell, as "Don Pedro," Prince of Arragon, and George S. Otto, as "Don John," his brother, handled their parts well. The difficult part of "Claudio," a young lord of Florence, was safely looked after by H. I. Coutt.

Miss W. Girdler, had a difficult part in that of "Hero, daughter of Leonato," but she handled it well, sharing honors with Miss Chown. One of the hits of the evening was the fine portrayal of "Dogberry," a constable, by P. T. Pilkey. He handled the role in a way that proved him a born actor. All the minor parts were in safe hands.

The music was supplied by the Queen's University Students' Orchestra, under the leadership of W. H. Walker. This is the first time that the orchestra has been heard in public in some time and its playing was certainly a treat. During the evening "the boys up above" gave a few yells and college songs.

The science candidates in the coming Alma Mater elections, Ellis, Bateman, Moran, McKav, Peeling, occupied a box, which was decorated with science banners, bearing election mottoes.

## REDUCTION OF LICENSES.

### The Moral and Social Reform League.

A meeting of the Moral and Social Reform League, presided by a meeting of the executive committee, was held at St. George's hall, last night. D. Laidlau, the president, being in the chair. The secretary, Rev. J. Charles Villiers, said that the meeting had been called on request to consider the question of the reduction of licenses in the city. The meeting was unanimously in favor of such reduction. Attention was called to the fact that all over the continent there was an increasing wave of temperance sentiment, and that large and populous areas were coming under prohibition. Dean Farthing, who expressed regret that he would be unable, owing to the fact that he would soon be leaving the city, to take an active part in the campaign, said that there were sections of the city that, obviously, had a needless number of hotels, for presumably, a reduction of licenses would be in the interest of morality. Elmer Davis, G. M. Macdonnell, Revs. W. H. Sparling, T. E. Burke, D. MacFavish, and others of both the clergy and laity spoke to the same effect.

## WILL DIE A PRISONER

### NO HOPE FOR PARDON OF SHORTIS

The Valleyfield Murderer—Death of the Young Irishman's Mother Leaves Him Hopeless—His Father Doesn't Want Him Pardoned.

It has been reported that Valentine Shortis, the young Irishman, whose brutal murder in Valleyfield, Que., about sixteen years ago, is still fresh in the minds of the people, is to be pardoned. Enquiry in official circles, however, reveals the fact that there is nothing in the rumor, and that Shortis will remain in prison till his remains are carried to the grave. Several years ago Shortis was removed from St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary to Portsmouth.

But Shortis' mother now lies in an Irish cemetery. It is a year since she passed to her long rest, after being so faithful to her erring son, and when she died she was again breathing the sweet air of Ireland, and treading the places where the shamrock grows, and his father does not want him released even if it were possible, as a sanitarium would be the only place suitable for him. Shortis therefore will never come forth from the penitentiary alive.

The young Irish murderer, when the sun of his father does not visit him in prison. Her sad earthly pilgrimage is over, and when she passed away, Shortis' last hopes of again breathing the sweet air of Ireland, and treading the places where the shamrock grows, vanished as a fog, before the sun. His father does not want him released even if it were possible, as a sanitarium would be the only place suitable for him. Shortis therefore will never come forth from the penitentiary alive.

An Ottawa prisoner, Henry Lefebvre, wanted to come to the Kingston Penitentiary, but instead, was sentenced to the Central Prison for nine months.

When asked by the magistrate why he wanted to go to the penitentiary, Lefebvre stated that he was very anxious to learn a trade. He was tired of the life he was living, and was ready to turn over a new leaf. Lefebvre stole a bicycle and a rug, and sold them to a second hand dealer. He told the police that this was the first time he ever was in trouble, but investigation proved this statement to be untrue.

At the Central Prison there is nothing but hard work, and nearly every prisoner prefers a sentence in the common jail or the penitentiary. Many prisoners arraigned in the police court in Kingston have expressed a great unwillingness to serve a term in the Central.
