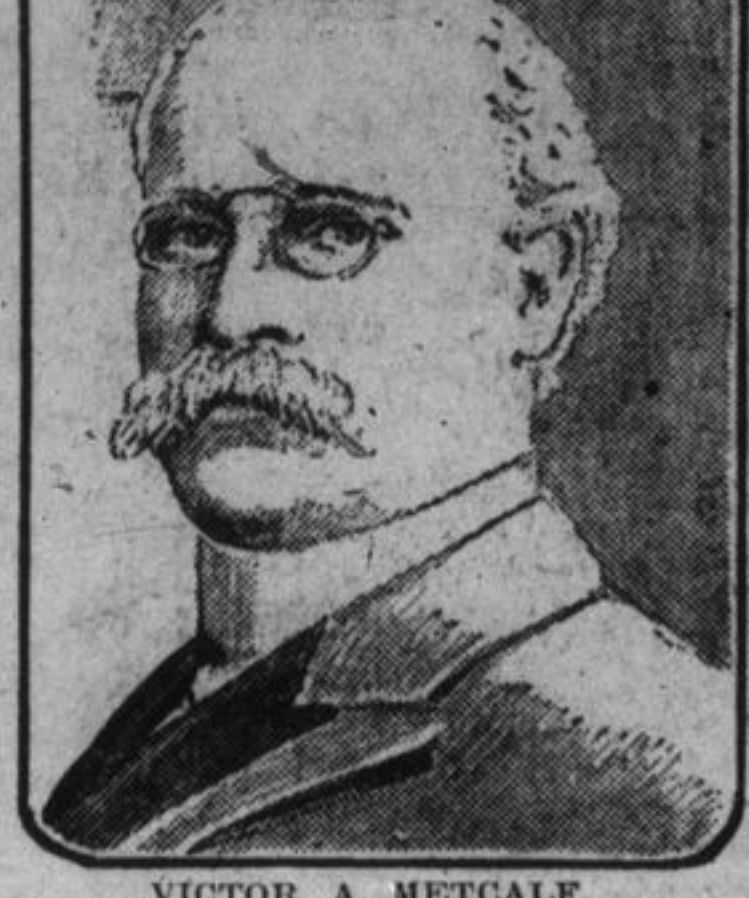

HE WAS IGNORED PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT DID NOT CONSULT HIM.

Affecting Naval Policy and the Conduct of His Department—Secretary Metcalf Has Thus Stepped Out.

Washington, Dec. 1.—Another change in the Roosevelt cabinet took place to-day when Victor H. Metcalf, of California, formally relinquished the portfolio of secretary of the navy and was succeeded by Truman H. Newberry, of Michigan, who had been assistant secretary in name, but secretary in fact, since November, 1905.

Secretary Metcalf has been a stickler for his prerogatives, but has found himself on repeated occasions

practically ignored by the president in important matters affecting naval policy and the conduct of his department.
Lack of health and the sense of isolation and estrangement between himself and President Roosevelt prompted Mr. Metcalf's resignation. He has been ill for a year and during the last two months he has scarcely been able to sit at his desk. Just before the election he had to cancel an engagement to speak in West Virginia. Since that time he has been able to be at the department parts of only two days.

Mr. Metcalf left Washington in the middle of last April, going to his home in California with a hope that he could regain his health. He remained there until September. He believed himself improved when he came back to Washington.

Since the beginning of his chief's illness Mr. Newberry has been head of the navy department, and President Roosevelt has looked to him for advice in the few matters of naval administration he did not feel he could manage by himself. Mr. Metcalf had been here to the con-

sulted, and, besides, his views and those of the president have not been of the same kind. His has been a policy of reticence with regard to the defects mentioned by critics of the ships of the navy, while that of President Roosevelt and Assistant Secretary Newberry has been one of openness and discussion.

Mr. Newberry is an enthusiast on naval matters, and is a close friend of the president. It is generally agreed he is a better business man and administrator than his predecessor, and is in close touch with the personnel of the navy. He has long been ambitious to be placed at the head of the navy department, and the knowledge of this fact possessed by Mr. Metcalf did not tend to foster cordial relations between them. The friends of the new secretary are hopeful he will make such a good record that he will be asked to remain by President-elect Taft after March 4th next.

NEW DAIRY SCHOOL

Opened at St. Hyacinthe, Que.—A Government School.
St. Hyacinthe, Que., Dec. 1.—The provincial dairy school for members of the Dairymen's Association opened here to-day. The course covers practically every phase of the dairy industry from the testing of milk to the inspection of boilers and engines. Courses are given in both French and English. Certificates are to be given to those who attend the whole course and qualify in the different branches. The teaching staff includes Prof. J. D. Leclair, superintendent and general inspector of creameries and other officials of the department of agriculture. The school is under the control of the government.

The Loan Refused.
Lisbon, Dec. 1.—With no money in the treasury to pay the November salaries of the Portuguese officials, the government has made an unsuccessful attempt to borrow \$5,000,000 from the Bank of Portugal. The loan was refused owing to the unsatisfactory condition of the government's collateral.

THE SPORT REVIEW.

Interesting News From the Various Sporting Fields.

Philadelphia, New England and Western Pennsylvania towns support professional basketball teams. Players receive \$2 to \$5 a game, and some receive higher salaries.

Pittsburg hockey magnates claim they refused a number of applications from Canadian players on account of their reputations for rough work. They should have refused a few more.

The Montreal A. A. hockey team refused to accept the amateur definition under which its own football team plays, and withdrew from the Interprovincial Amateur Hockey League.

At the Hamilton-Varsity rugby match in Toronto, there were in attendance, 7,500; from Hamilton, 1,600. Receipts, \$4,500; Tigers' share, \$2,000; Varsity, \$2,000; Canadian Union, \$150; rent of Rosedale, \$150; other expenses, \$200.

Manager Long of the Jeffries Athletic Club, Los Angeles, Cal., sent a telegram to "Batting" Nelson at Hegewisch, Ill., offering him a fight with Freddie Welsh, for forty-five rounds in January. Long states that Welsh declared he would bet Nelson \$5,000 on the side.

Joe Gans, who sent to New York from Baltimore a certified cheque for \$1,000 to bind a match with "Packey" McFarland, Gans openly challenged McFarland when the Chicago boxer fought "Tommy" Murphy at Philadelphia last week, but no attention was paid to him.

"Tom" Longboat has not raced since the event in Fall River, owing to "indisposition." He has two on for next Saturday, afternoon and night, at Philadelphia; he then rests and trains till December 15th, when he goes against Dorando Pietri, at Madison Square, the Marathon distance. Manager Flanagan reported that the contract between the Indian and the Italian was signed on Saturday.

Toronto World: In every game there is always some play that stands out more prominently than the others. Four years ago it was Casey Baldwin's late kick that resulted in a try and netted the blue and white the championship. Saturday it was Corry's mistake before Hendry for one of his own players, when Varsity was in possession, that resulted in their own line. The result was a loose ball behind the line, which Marriot secured for a try, and, as Moore converted, the fatal mistake cost six points and the championship.

Ottawa Free Press: On behalf of the Ottawa Hockey Club two former Ottawa gentlemen are today using their good offices in an effort to make arrangements with Herbie Clarke of Toronto to play here this winter. The report emanating from a Toronto source there was no chance of Clarke coming to Ottawa, that he did not know he was wanted here, etc.; is all a concoction or a steer by Clarke to throw the newspapermen off the scent. Clarke has been communicating with the Ottawa Club indirectly for six weeks and has actually expressed himself as being anxious to play here. It is believed, however, he wishes to continue as an amateur.

WILL BE ADMITTED.

Some Restrictions Removed at Windsor.

Windsor, Ont., Nov. 30.—Dressed meats, skins, shoes, hats and hoods, wool and bristles that do not originate in any of the five American states now under quarantine, will now be admitted to Canada through Windsor, in accordance with instructions that Customs Collector Smith has issued. The goods, including the one that pulled the mail waggon between Windsor and Detroit post office, are still barred and also all live stock. This order is a real concession to Canadian importers, who felt the general application of the government ban keenly.

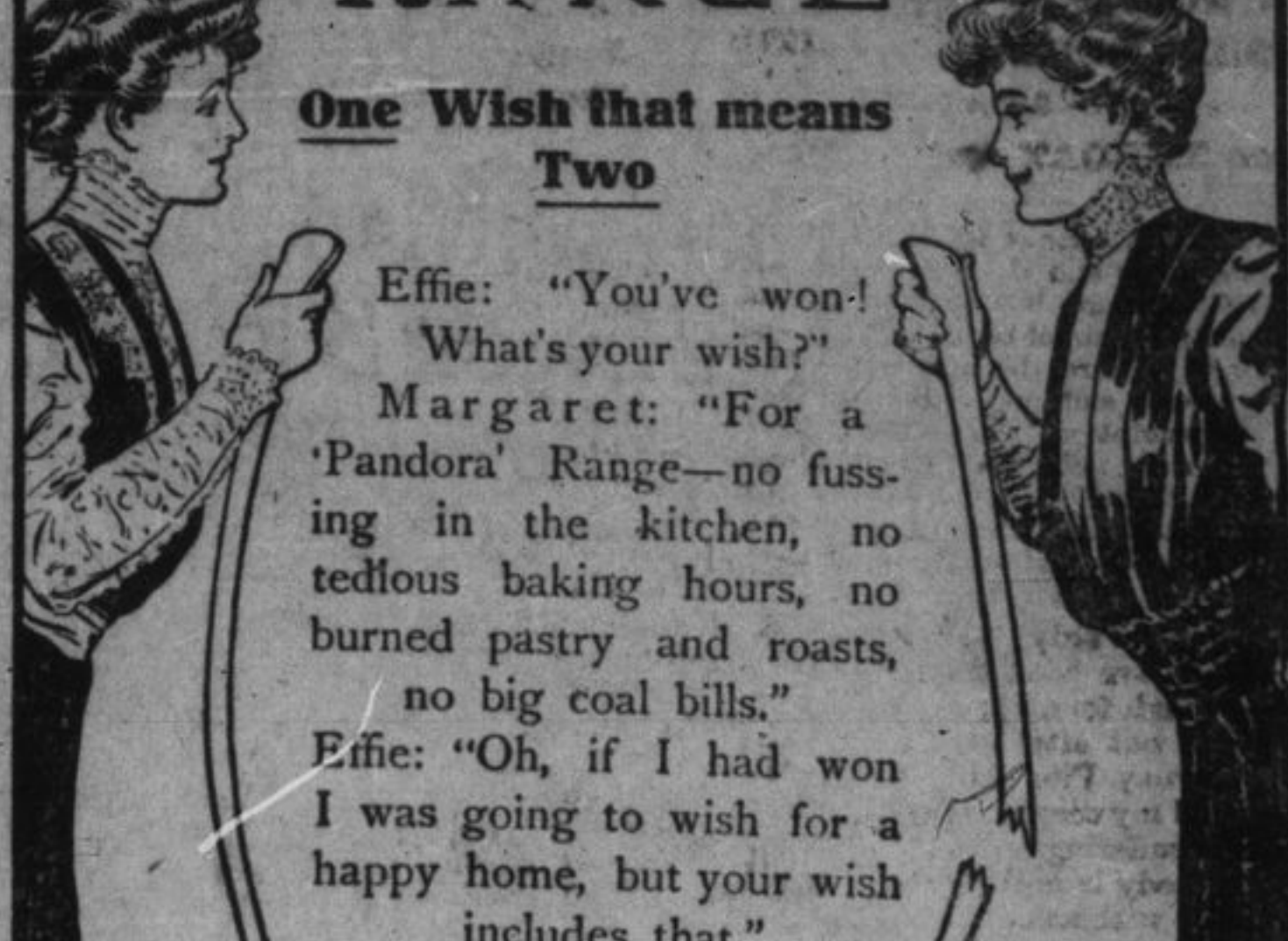
