**BOARD OF HEALTH PRAISED**  
By Dr. Bibbins, New York State Medical Expert.

There have been statements freely made that the disease which attacked a number of people here was not what the local doctors and the Ontario Provincial Board of Health expert pronounced it, and that Dr. Charles N. Bibbins, medical expert of the New York State Board of Health, who was recently here, had said it was only chickenpox. The Whig wrote Dr. Bibbins about the matter, and has just received his reply which states that he carefully examined all the cases at the fort and found that every one of them had the real disease claimed. Dr. Bibbins further says: "I found the Kingston Board of Health energetic, and their method of isolation and quarantine were most excellent. Upon investigation, I found that vaccination was being given generally. I doubt whether the vaccination restriction at Cape Vincent would have been raised had I found a less energetic Board of Health."

**OLDEST IN WORLD.**  
Osip Susselitch, a Cossack, Was Born Dec. 16th, 1773.

Moscow, Russia, Dec. 1.—Osip Susselitch, a Cossack, was the oldest man in the world until he died recently at the truly venerable age of one hundred and thirty-five years.

Such is the news from Tiflis, where Susselitch, who had lived more than one-fourteenth part of the Christian era, breathed his last. That he should have lived so long may seem incredible in these days. But excellent authorities, including the Kavkaz, Russia's official newspaper in Tiflis, insist there can be no doubt that Osip Susselitch was born Dec. 16, 1773. That is the very day and date on which, on the other side of the world, the "rebels" threw the British tea into Boston Harbor.

This patriarch of nearly a century and a half was a man in his prime when Napoleon the Great made the disastrous invasion of Russia. But Susselitch did not fight with "General Frost" in defence of his country. Forty years later, however, when he was four score years of age he fought against the English, French and Sardinian allies in the Crimea and helped to defend Sebastopol. He used to tell of fighting near Count Tolstoy, then a young officer of the artillery, Susselitch served in the Russian army in several Asiatic campaigns, and for ten years lived in captivity among the Turcomans of Central Asia.

Susselitch never married; flippant bachelors may ascribe his long term of years to his single blessedness. But it may be that he regretted his lonely life; certainly he had a strange mental amusement for a bachelor. He was fond of estimating how many of his descendants he would have seen had he married early and had his children and their children been ordinary prolific. He set the number at 973.

**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.**

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—Six months' residence upon the land, and the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate five acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emptive may purchase a quarter-section in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate five acres extra.

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**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.**

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$100 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person within years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended on the claim and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING.—Claims generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be granted to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 25 per cent on the output, exceeds \$10,000.
