HEATED AT TIMES

A LIVELY ARGUMENT IN OTTAWA LAST NIGHT.

Prof. Adam Shortt Took Exception to Some of Statements Made—Mrs. Warnock is to Lodge An Appeal.

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—An interesting, and at times somewhat heated, argument occurred between Prof. Adam Shortt, formerly of Queen's University and now civil service Commissioner, a few other Ottawans and a speaker at a meeting of the Ottawa local socialist party. The Canadian socialist party had gathered to hear an address by Benjamin Wilson, the American socialist. The socialist speaker, a British labor man, and a little Englishman, made some strong statements to the methods used in furthering the British empire and was taken up sharply by Professor Shortt and others. The discussion finally drifted toward broader issues, becoming acrimonious at times.

Mrs. Agnes Warnock will appeal against the decision of Justice Falconbridge at Brockville, on November 23, when he gave judgment admitting to probate the will of the late J. G. Warnock, made an hour before his death. T. W. McGarry leaves to-night for Toronto where he will lodge the appeal.

The mortality statistics of the city for November, show a total of 103 deaths. Nine were due to typhoid, six to consumption, six to whooping cough and one to diphtheria.

The annual report of the department of Indian affairs, just issued, showing that during the fiscal year, ending last March, the population of Indians was 110,000, a decrease of forty. The preceding year showed an increase of 169. The falling off is attributed to tuberculosis. The expenditure for destitution which ten years ago was \$372,000, is now \$146,000.

In the supreme court, to-day, application for appeal in the case of Lynn vs. Canada Foundry Co., was dismissed with costs fixed at \$50. A man named Ede was killed on a bridge being built by the Foundry company and Lynn was injured. Both cases were at first decided against the company and \$500 awarded Lynn. This was upheld by the division court but the court of appeals ordered a new trial. The company appealed as to right in the Ede case and asked for leave in the Lynn case so that there would be no possibility of the two cases resulting differently.

STUDENT COMMITS SUICIDE. Jumps From Rock to Ground 100 Feet Below.

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 2.—John Allan White, twenty years of age, of Waterbury, N. Y., student in the High Graduate School, committed suicide by jumping from the top of West Rock to the ground below, a distance of 100 feet. The body was badly mangled from having come in contact with the rocks.

That White contemplated taking his life is borne out by a letter which was found in his room, addressed to his father, and which was taken to a relative living here, who opened it. The contents of the letter were not given out, but it is understood that in it he states that he contemplated committing suicide. It is thought that his mind was temporarily deranged from overwork and worry over the illness of his brother and sister from typhoid fever.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled from All Over The World. Navigation on Lake Superior is at a standstill owing to fierce storms.

In a snowstorm the steamer Inverness went ashore on the Morrison Falls, up Grand River, P.E.I. The people of Port Au Prince have revolted against the government, and are in complete possession of the city.

At Pepperville, Mass., burglars blew open the First National Bank, securing \$14,000 in cash. They escaped in an automobile.

The Grand Trunk railway seems to be having considerable trouble with the men taken to Battle Creek, from Port Huron, two months ago. Frederick Dumouchelle, Walkerville, and Fred. Paquette, Amherstburg, pleaded guilty, at Detroit, to aiding in a counterfeiting swindle.

Experiments in Germany have proved that it is almost impossible for airships to escape the fire of rifles and cannon on the ground.

At Chicago, a federal grand jury has begun an investigation of rebate charges made against the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway. The International Harvester Signal company, of Ottawa, has just shipped six acetylene gas buoys to the Panama canal and four to Chemulpa, Corea.

James Henderson, postal service inspector for the Toronto district, has been given six months' leave of absence, which he will spend in Bermuda.

Roy Conlton, Beaver township, to spend three years in penitentiary for criminal assault in Toronto; Allan Blasdel, for same offence got one year.

In San Salvador, a plot to overthrow the government of President Fuguerena was discovered and frustrated. Martial law has been proclaimed.

The Shah of Persia has commissioned an agent to purchase a beautiful estate in South Russia, whether he has decided to flee if the anarchy in Persia spreads.

At London, Ont., Simon Swartz, a Jewish merchant, drove in front of a moving street car and received injuries from which he died less than an hour later.

The text of the diplomatic notes signed and exchanged at Washington, on Monday, setting forth the articles of the recent American-Japanese agreement, relative to the far east, are published.

While not in her right mind, Mrs. Samuel McNeice, wife of a farmer at Frome, Ont., escaped from the house where she was being guarded and jumped into the cistern. Her lifeless body was recovered from the cistern.

The final game of the intermediate rugby championship of Canada, will be played at the cricket ground, Hamilton, Ont., next Saturday afternoon, when the Grand Trunk team, of Montreal, will meet the Tigers.

At Toronto, George E. Heathfield, who collected large amounts of money by representing himself to be the official collector of a well known charity, was found to be insane, and was remanded for committal to an asylum.

The statement of claim in the suit of Hon. George E. Foster, for damages of \$50,000 for alleged libel, against J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Globe, has been filed. The action is based on remarks made by Mr. Macdonald, in a speech made at Orillia.

George Adamson, the ex-water rate collector for Toronto, was found guilty of stealing \$2,200 from the city. Evidence was adduced to show that he was suffering from mental weakness, induced by the use of cocaine and other drugs. Adamson was remanded for sentence.

Rev. P. P. Christianien, editor of the German Post, of Pembroke, died on Wednesday morning of typhoid fever. He was formerly pastor of the Lutheran church at Waterloo, Ont., Saginaw, Mich., and Arrprior, Ont. He edited the Post at Arrprior, for three years, and has been editor at Pembroke for three years.

An express from the west jumped the track at Prairie Siding, near Chatham, Ont., owing, it is alleged, to section men having left the switch on the main line open. Engineer H. Cronch and Fireman J. Cummings both jumped, the former getting one of his legs hurt, while the latter sustained a broken arm. The passengers escaped injury.

QUEBEC BRIDGE COMPANY.

Government Pays It \$350,000 For Its Stock. Quebec, Dec. 2.—Stockholders of the Quebec Bridge company have been notified that the government has resolved to exercise its power to take over the whole of the undertaking, assets, property and franchises of the company, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 59 of the acts of the parliament of Canada, 1908, and under the agreement executed between the government and the Quebec Bridge and Railway company. They are, therefore, notified to call at the company's office, for the reimbursement in cash of their respective shares, with interest and premium. There are 159 shareholders, who in cash and securities contributed a capital nominally paid up of \$263,700. With the interest allowed at the rate of five per cent. on the amount of the stock credited as being paid and a premium of ten per cent., the total payment by the government will be about \$355,000. The government has already assumed liability for the company's bonds. It will, on the completion of the present payment, be the owner of what remains of the company's works.

Almost in Two By Municipal Plant. Orillia, Dec. 2.—At a special meeting of the council to-night the charges of electric light under municipal ownership were reduced.

For stores, from 28c. to 18c. per lamp a month. For houses, from 20c. to 18c. a month. This is for twenty-four-hour power every day.

Last year there was a profit of \$10,000 after meeting all charges, which was applied to the reduction of taxes. Even with the reduced cost of light to consumers this year, it is expected that there will be the same surplus, as 1,000 new lights have been installed in the past three months.

Under private ownership the cost of lighting was about 35c. per lamp. Had it not been for unforeseen difficulties in installing the plant at Ragged Rapids, Orillia would now be paying only 12c. to 13c. for light.

ASKED TO APPROVE. The Frontenac County Good Roads By-Law. A deputation from the county of Frontenac waited upon the Ontario government, in Toronto, Wednesday morning, and presented the plans and specifications for the good roads in the county. It asked the government to approve the plans, so that it might get the usual government grant towards the expenditure on the roads.

On the deputation were: A. Rankin, chairman of the good roads committee of the council; J. S. Gallagher, M.P.P., and W. F. Nickle, M.P.P. The government, through the public works department, will decide upon the question at an early date.
