CANADIAN RUGBY FINAL MATCHES.

Woodstock Has Built a Fine Cinder Path—In Six Years the Hamilton Tigers Have Lost Only Three Matches.
Ernest Barry, the English sculling champion, refused an offer to row in Australia.
An English rugby player was sent to jail for a month for assaulting a referee who had ordered him off the field for rough play.
The race which Albert Shrubb, the English professional runner, was to have run against a relay team at Brockville, has been postponed until a later date.
The National Gymnastics of Italy has resolved to consider Borando a professional runner on the ground that he was paid to compete with Hayes in the so-called Marathon race at New York.
In six years the Hamilton Tigers have lost but three rugby games, Ottawa Rough Riders taking two and Montreal one. The latter game was lost in Hamilton, and the two Ottawa games at Ottawa.
The Montreal Star, in discussing the Tiger-Varsity match in Toronto, says: "As a football match pure and simple it could not compare with the match in Kingston, as a spectacle it surpassed all the football matches in the history of Canada."
Woodstock, which years ago was one of the recognized centres of athletic sport in Ontario, promises to make every effort to regain its old position. The Woodstock A.A., have built a cinder path which, the Sentinel-Review says, will be the equal of those at Halifax and Montreal, the only first-class running paths in Canada.
At the annual meeting of the Lake Yacht Racing Association at Toronto amendments made by the Kingston yacht club, making it compulsory to have a cabin-house on class B eighteen-foot racing boats, also allowing crew of four instead of three in this class, were adopted. The next annual meeting will be held in Kingston.
Montreal Star: Pitre, the well-known lacrosse and hockey player, and his friends, are anxiously looking for Chauver Elliott, with whom Pitre dealt when he made his tentative arrangements to play for the Montreal hockey team. It is stated that Ed- monton has offered him a big salary, twelve hundred dollars, it is said, and his fare, if he will come and play with them for the Stanley cup.
In the intermediate series of the Canadian rugby union Hamilton II, champions of the Interprovincial union, will play the Grand Trunks, champions of the Quebec union, in Montreal, on Dec. 5th. In the junior series Parkdale, of the Interprovincial, will play Varsity III, of the Interprovincial, on Dec. 5th. Lindsay, of the O.R.F.U., will play the winners in Toronto on Dec. 12th.
