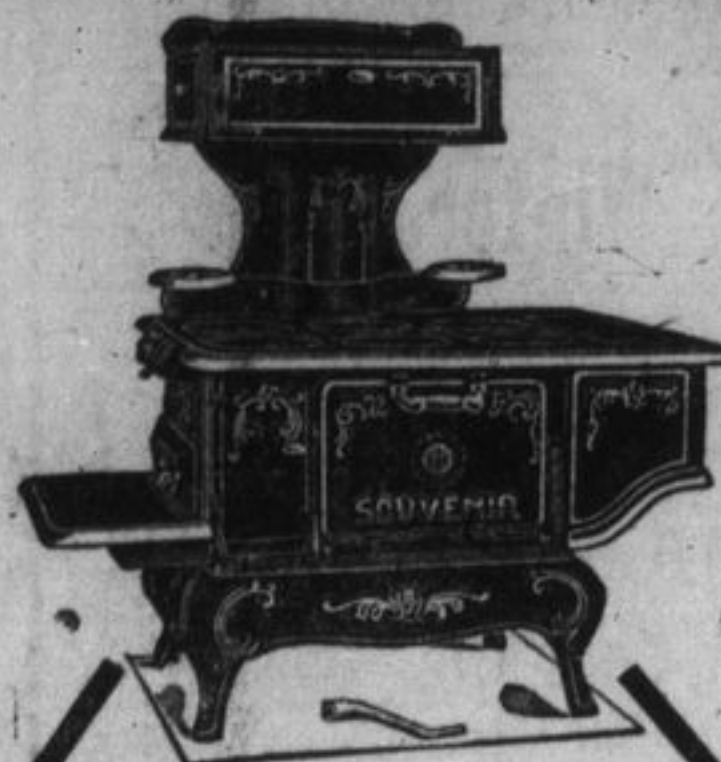

**synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.**

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section (100 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made if any agency, on certain conditions, by a brother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land prior to each of three years. A homesteader may live either on his homestead or on a separate tract of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time allowed to earn homestead patent) and cultivate 1/2 acre extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right cannot obtain a pre-emptive right. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands in either old or even numbered Sections south of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the 4th Meridian and the South Railway line. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

**synopsis of Canadian Northwest WEST MINING REGULATIONS.**

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

MINING CLAIMS—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. An amount \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended or other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PRELIMINARY CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

PROSPECTING—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, \$4 per acre after the output exceeds \$10,000.
