

New York, Dec. 2 .- Morris Schwartz, twenty-two years of age, of No. 516 North Second street, Philadelphia, was held in \$5,000 bail by a police magis-trate to await the action of the grand jury on a charge of having shot Rose and Annie Samowitch, elder sisters of his fiancee, Yetta, in this city on November 14th, then shooting himself. 
