THE HOCKEY OUTLOOK

THE MATERIAL QUEEN'S HAS ON HAND.

Collegiate Institute Has An Open Air Rink For Its Team—Will a City League Be Organized This Winter?

From the present outlook there will be a big fight for the intercollegiate hockey championship this winter. All the college teams will be strong, but Toronto University who went through last year without a defeat, have only two or three of their last season's team. McGill have also lost one or two good men, while Queen's stand pat with the exception of "Bill" Bennett, between the nets. It looks very much like Queen's unless Varsity and McGill make some rare finds in their men. On Varsity, "Herb" Clarke, Poms, Davidson Evans, and their goal tender of last year's team, will not be out this season. That leaves two players of the old line up, to build a new team around.

Queen's have three men from whom to pick a goal-keeper; Hugh Macdonnell for point, Pennock for cover, McLaughlin, Crawford, Dobson, George Campbell, and in all probability some good men among the new ones to pick from a strong team which he secured from the above, one that could make most of them hustle.

Collegiate Open Rink.

The Kingston Collegiate students have completed all the work that they can do at present on their open air rink near the school. Banking, bonny have been put up about eight inches high all around, and the ground is all levelled off. The K. C. I. boys should have a team this year that will make a good showing in the Junior Intercollegiate series, against Queen's and Carleton. A meeting will be held shortly to elect officers for the season.

Won't Enter Teams.

It is not likely that the St. George's or the Frontenacs will put teams in the Junior O. H. A. series this season. All the junior players will gather under the colors of the 14th Club. There are a great many junior players in the city who are fast enough to catch a place if they will get out and work for it. The season's work will be mapped out at the armoueries on Monday evening.

City Hockey League.

What about a City Hockey League this winter? Who is going to take a hand and make it a success. Last season the K. A. H. A. was the most successful ever managed in the city, and it is to be hoped that the same fellows will come forward again this season and run the show. Many teams would enter both senior and junior series. Two fine cups are there to be played for, one for junior and one for senior, and it would not be right to see the league fall through.

The only drawback at present seems to be the loss of a few open air rinks. From present appearances there will be no open rink in the city that the teams could play league games on. This makes it rather difficult as it is hard to secure the covered rink, and it would also increase the expenses of the league considerably.

Did Not Come Off.

The indoor baseball match scheduled for Thursday evening did not come off. The Sergeants and No. 3 company were to play, but the latter did not turn up. The next game will be played on Tuesday night, between the Sergeants and No. 5 company. The sergeants have not lost a game yet this season. The regular league games have not started yet. The schedule will likely commence after Christmas.

MARINE NEWS.

What is Found About the Wharves.

All the vessels of the Folger fleet have been laid up, with the exception of the steamer Wanderer, on the Cape Vincent route.

The steamer Rosemont has loaded grain at Fort William, for Richardson's elevator. A vessel has already loaded corn at Cornwall for this elevator.

The steamer Carleton, which cleared for Hamilton on her last trip to Fort William, is reported to be at Timber Island, where she had to take shelter from the storm.

The steamer Prince Rupert arrived Friday morning, from Fort William, with grain for Richardson's elevator. Her cargo consisted of 60,000 bushels of oats, 20,000 bushels of barley, and 12,000 bushels of wheat.

With ice two inches thick on her hatches, and with an ice-covered deck, the steamer Prince Rupert, which arrived at Richardson's elevator, this morning looked more as if she had made a trip from the North Pole. The vessel had a very stormy passage, but had a most successful trip. Capt. Malone is in charge of the Prince Rupert.

AT THE GRAND.

"The Devil" Was Seen By a Large Audience.

"The Devil," written by Franz Molnar, a play which has been without doubt the most talked of, during the present theatrical season, was the attraction at the Grand last night, and was seen by a large audience. Different reports had been made upon the merits of the play. Some held that it was a play which should be set aside, and another report was that it was indeed some to believe that it was a play that should not be patronized. At any rate, all this comment did not appear to have any effect on the attendance, and the consensus of opinion was that it was a wonderful play, and presented by a most capable company.

True, "The Devil" is not a morality play. The leading role is taken by a personal devil, who smiles at every turn, and who has control over every person. Marked ability is shown in this character, by Edwin Stevens. In the portrayal of this part, there is something somewhat unusual in the fact that he has no make-up. He is tall, slender, with very large, lean hands, and in every way looks the part. One would naturally imagine him to be rather an unwelcome character, but on the other hand, he is highly amusing, even with his silly grin or in his burst of laughter. No doubt, if the play were given by a poor company, it would appear in an altogether different light, but with such a well-balanced company all this is covered up. The devil displays humor, and all through the play there is a ripple of laughter, but still there is something which would make one hate to be in his power. Perhaps the most prominent feature of his character is his infinite knowledge of human nature, and its weaknesses. He is not slow to show up the truth to the world.

In addition to the devil, there are four leading parts, and all of them are well handled. As Olga Hofmann, the banker's wife, Frances Nordstrom gave full justice to the role. Paul McAllister was fitted in every way for the part of the artist, and Marion Lorne, as the model, was exceedingly clever. Ethel Clayton, as Elsa Berg, an heiress, displayed marked talent. O. J. Vanasse, the old servant, was an interesting character. The play was richly staged.
